

1967 REUNION IN PITTSBURGH A SMASH!

The four men shown on today's cover are all former artillery men from C-879 who joined the rest of the 69th Infantry Division Association for a memorable weekend in Pittsburgh this past August. The boat ride was only one of many events which had been arranged for visiting 69-ers by the Pittsburgh Reunion Committee. As previously predicted the week-end turned out to be a very busy one, and for some 69-ers, somewhat extended in length----a few arrived as early as Wednesday night. By Thursday night, an Advance Party of considerable size had arrived, as evidenced by attendance at the Early Bird Dinner. The factory tours to H. J. Heinz and Jones & Laughlin Steel on Friday were well booked, and proved to be most interesting to all who participated. The Friday night Beer Bust brought together almost as many 69-ers as the Saturday Banquet for an evening of good fellowship, interspersed with entertainment and community singing to piano accompaniment.

Influential Pittsburgh members arranged for some wonderful TV publicity on the local channels to rouse out 69-ers in the area. Harry Austin (AT-272) was interviewed and taped on Friday for a couple of spots in the TV news on Saturday. President Harold Starry (Hq-272) appeared on live TV on the Saturday noon news in a five minute interview by Maria Torres. of Harry's kids caught him watching two TV sets at the same time and thought Pop had gone off his rocker---Harry was just trying to watch both his taped interview and Harold's live show which happened to be scheduled at the same time on two different channels! We all had our chance to appear on TV on Saturday afternoon at the Memorial Ceremony held at the Point Park----We had TV coverage there too. In this instance Rev. Russell Milnes (Divarty) and Col. George Landis (880 F.A.) were the principal speakers. The publicity brought in quite a few local 69-ers who were not previously on our mailing list. As a matter of fact, one such 69-er, David Scatena (G-271), saw one of the news broadcasts and dashed down to the hotel arriving during the banquet. Shorty Reynolds (G-271) cornered him and sold him some raffle tickets for the scholarship fund, and about an hour later Dave became the proud owner of

a new TV set when his number was drawn. Some people have all the luck!

Saturday morning at the business meeting we were honored by a visit and warm welcome to Pittsburgh by Mayor Barr in person. We felt expecially honored since he was scheduled to leave for Vietnam the next day and, in spite of many last minute obligations, he had taken the time to come to the hotel to meet our group.

The Ladies Auxiliary also held a meeting on Saturday A.M. at which a demonstration was presented in the art of gift wrapping——all the ladies who attended can now produce a professional looking package for the old man for his birthday or for Christmas. (Let's hope that the contents of the box are as interesting as the outside.) Door prizes were also distributed.

Saturday afternoon was spent in organized sightseeing, both by bus and boat and, sad to say, was partially spoiled by an unfavorable turn in the weather. Still, many hardy souls managed to see quite a bit of Pittsburgh in spite of the intermittent rain. The boat ride was particularly pleasant, somewhat reminescent of the ride down the Rhine that our European tourists took in 1965, although the surrounding landscape was quite different.

The Saturday night banquet, as usual, was the climax of the weekend. Harry Austin, who played M.C. for the evening, was true to his word and kept the speeches down to a minimum, leaving plenty of time for partying and dancing to the music of Tommy Carlyn and his fine orchestra.

All in all, a good reunion---a very good one indeed. A lot of old familiar faces, and many new ones not seen recent-ly, perhaps not since the war. If you missed this reunion, you missed one of the best.















Dewey..he has been there since the end of the war and he is married to a delightful Belgian lady by the name of Yvonne, and they have an equally lovely and delightful young daughter named Danielle. You will find him to be most helpful..they are grand people.
