Dear Bob:

Thanks very much, for including me in the 69th Division Reunion. I felt as welcome as if I had actually been a member of the division, instead of only spending a few nights in the field with it, when "home" on vacation from high school.

I am sure I don't have to tell you how much Dad enjoyed beign there. The time there was like a shot of adrenilin to him, and the anticipation of the Reunion had already done much good for him. I talked to him by phone this morning. He was a little sore in some muscles he hadn't used much lately, but his spirits were still much bouyed by the Reunion.

You will recall that we discussed the automatic award of the Bronze Star for meritorious service to anyone who was awarded the CIB in World War II, and that I promised to get the information on the subject so that it could be published in the 69th Bulletin. Here is the information:

Anyone awarded a CIB in World War II, who has not received a Bronze Star for meritorious service in conjunction with that award, should write to the U.S. Army Military Personnel Center and request the award. The letter should enclose a copy of the individual's discharge papers [which should reflect award of the CIB] or a copy of the orders awarding him the CIB. The letter should look like this:

Dear Sir:

In accordance with paragraph 2-14b(2), AR 672-5-1, request I be awarded the Bronze Star Medal for Meritorious Service. I enclose a copy of my discharge certificate (or CIB orders) showing my award of the CIB.

Festung Ehrenbreitstein

(Editor's Note: The following article was furnished from the records of E. A. Stelzer, who served in C-Company of the 273rd Infantry Regiment).

At 11:00 A.M., on March 27, 1945, Fort Ehrenbreitstein, commanding the junction of the Rhine and Moselle Rivers, fell to troops of the Fighting 69th. It was here, in January, 1923, that the American Flag was lowered, when the United States Army of Occupation left Germany, after World War I.

On Army Day, 6 April, 1945, the same Flag was raised by a Special Honor Guard of the 69th Infantry Division, symbolizing the victorious re-entry of American troops into Germany.

69th TAKES FORT EHRENBREITSTEIN, GERMANY MARCH 27, 1945

Less than four months after landing in England, the 69th Division commanded by Major General E. F. Reinhardt, was seeing action for the first time in the inner Siegfried defences. By March 27, it had broken through the crumbling line, crossed the Rhine and captured the historic fortress of Ehrenbreitstein citadel of the American Army of Occupation after World War I.

The 272nd Combat Team which spearheaded the Fighting 69th drive across the Rhine, was comprised of the First Battallion of the 273rd Infantry, and the Second Battalion of the 272nd Infantry.

Standing poised on the west bank of the Rhine, after its drive into the Rhineland, the 69th Division sent a combat team commanded by Colonel Walter D. Buie, across the river on March 16th. Threatened by the encircling American Forces, the enemy began to withdraw rapidly eastward.

Encountering but light opposition from enemy rear guard elements, the 273rd First Battalion, and the 272nd Second Battalion completed a pincer-like movement around the fort and captured 163 prisoners. The fortress fell to the 69th at 11:00 A.M., on March 27th, and was one of the 42 localities that were cleared by the combat team in a two-day operation.

General Reinhardt, former Commanding General of the IX Corps, who assumed Command of the 69th Division September 2, 1944, served as a Major with the 4th Infantry Division's 8th Infantry, during the occupation of Ehrenbreitstein.

ARMY DAY — FORT EHRENBREITSTEIN, GERMANY 8 APRIL, 1945

In a special Army Day Ceremony, attended by General Omar Bradley and other Army leaders, an Honor Guard of the 69th Infantry Division raised the American Flag over Fort Ehrenbreitstein for a second time in a generation. In a short address, General Bradley told how Allied Troops occupied, portions of western Germany after World War I. "This fortress, Ehrenbreitstein," he said, "Was in the United States zone of occupation. On the 23rd day of January, 1923, the last of the American Occupation forces, headed home from Germany, and the Flag of the United States was lowered from these ramparts. Only 16 years later, Germany, under new and ruthless leadership engulfed the World in a new and terrible War. Although forced into a War, they did not want the Allies to have by their united efforts now assured, conquest of Germany. Ten days ago, troops of the First United States Army, captured this Rhine fortress of Ehrenbreitstein. Once more, as a symbol not only of American, but of Allied might, this very same Flag that was drawn down in 1923, has been raised here, today. In the years between World War I and World War II, this Flag was preserved in the War Department. Only recently, it was flown here for this ceremony. It has been raised today, by a special Honor Guard of the 69th Infantry Division. It was this Division that re-captured Ehrenbreitstein, scarcely more than a week ago."

ARMY DAY CELEBRATION AT EHRENBREITSTEIN ONE OF THE HISTORIC MOMENTS OF THE WAR

Present at the Army Day Ceremony at Ehrenbreitstein, were the Commanding Generals of the United States Armies of the Twelfth Army Group, in addition to General Bradley, and other Army leaders.

The military smartness of Honor Guards, the surroundings of the ancient fortress, the News photographers hovering in the background, presented a scene of historic and aweinspiring solemnity. For the Flag raising, the Honor Guards and the reviewing stand, formed a square around the Flag pole. To the left of the reviewing stand was the Guard of Honor for General Bradley, a Company from the 28th Infantry Division. To the right of the stand, were two Platoons of the 8th Infantry, and directly opposite the stand, was the Honor Guard of the 69th Infantry Division.

The Flag which was sent from Washington, for the occasion, was brought to the ceremony by the 8th Infantry Honor Guard. Two soldiers stepped forward with the Flag and handed it over to representatives of the 69th's Honor Guard, who in turn, raised it over Ehrenbreitstein. The National Anthem was played by the 28th Infantry Division Band, on captured German instruments.

COINCIDENTAL

By one of those odd coincidences, not usual in War, Major General Reinhardt, who Commanded the 69th Infantry Division which raised the Flag over Ehrenbreitstein, was a Major in the Fourth Division, 8th Infantry, the Unit that lowered the Flag in 1923.

For the information of the membership, the following is a reprint of the Scholarship/Welfare Fund Trust Agreement, which is to be revised.

(Editor's Note: For those who have written since the Trust Agreement was published in a past Bulletin, and again in this Bulletin, a Welfare Fund HAS NEVER BEEN ESTABLISHED by the 69th Division Association. All monies in the fund belongs to the Scholarship part of the fund. Any member belonging to the 69th Division Association can have his son or daughter apply for a Scholarship Award by writing Samuel Woolf, 241 Waverly Road, Scarsdale, New York 10583. Sammy is the Scholarship Chairman, and the only stipulation for a member is that he is in good standing with the Association by having his dues paid-up for the past two years, and that his membership continue during the term of his son or daughters' attendance in college.)

REPRINT OF SCHOLARSHIP/WELFARE FUND TRUST AGREEMENT INFORMATION . . .

As most of you know, the 69th Infantry Division Association maintains a Welfare and Scholrship Fund which is used to grant Scholarship Awards competitively, to outstanding students about to graduate from high school, before continuing in college, technical school, school of nursing or other advanced studies. Currently the award has been \$200 per year for a total of up to \$800, assuming the student continues studies for four years.

In response to inquiries from several members, the following is the test of the Trust Agreement which provides for the control and management of the awards:

This Trust Agreement made this 3rd day of August, 1966, by and between the 69th INFANTRY DIVISION ASSOCIATION, INC., a New York membership corporation with its principal office at 19 Barberry Road, West Islip, New York, hereinafter referred to as Settler and the President, Executive Vice President, Treasurer and all past presidents of the said 69th Infantry Division Association, Inc., hereinafter individually and jointly referred to as Trustees.

WHEREAS the Settler has established a Welfare and Scholarship Fund for its members, and wives, and children of its members, and widows, and children of deceased members, and

WHEREAS it is the intention of this Trust Agreement to set up all funds now or hereafter earmarked for welfare and scholarship purposes, and

WHEREAS it is the intention of the Settler to give honor to its comrades in arms, and wives, widows and children of its comrades in arms and to help when necessary, and to extend at all times to recognized scholars a sum of money in appreciation of those students' scholarship.

NOW, THEREFORE,

1. The Settler does hereby set apart from its general funds the sum of \$3,391.44 in its Welfare and Scholarship Fund into which shall be deposited all funds heretofore received and

General Remembers

69th's Bo

Retired Army Gen. Charles L. Bolte has many memories of his 39 years of duty, but he considers one of his most notable experiences the year and more he spent as commanding general preparing the 69th Infantry Division for combat in World War II.

That's why the general is the very special honored guest of the 69th Infantry Division Association, which is holding its annual reunion through Sunday at the Host Inn, Swatara Twp.

The onetime vice chief of staff of the Army (1953-55) has nothing but praise for the "esprit de corps" of the veterans of the 69th.

Of the division and its personnel, Bolte told the Sunday Patriot-News in an interview, "This division was the only one activated in May 1943 and was demobilized after the war and has no identity with any part of the country. The divisions of the regular Army have a permanence and the divisions of the National Guard are permanently located.

"The 69th was in for a brief period of World War II, and to find the esprit de corps is very outstanding, and for me it is quite a source of pride."

Noting that 572 were expected to be present for the Saturday night brief memorial service and banquet, he said that "to produce a reunion of this character" means that those planning the get-together have to rely on the individual veterans. "The esprit de corps is phenomenal," he said.



When the United States entered World War II Bolte was stationed in London, having begun a tour in May 1941 in charge of war plans for the Special Army Observer Group. In January 1942, he was assigned as chief of staff of the United States Forces in the United Kingdom, with headquarters in London. The following July he was selected to be the first chief of staff of the newly established European Theater of Operations with headquarters in England.

He returned to the United States in August 1942, assigned to Headquarters, Army Ground Forces in Washington, D.C. A month later he was on his way to become assistant commander of the 51st Infantry Division at Camp White, Ore.

Then came the orders to activate, train and build a new division, the 69th (no relationship to the 69th Infantry Regiment of World War I fame) in the heat and humidity of Camp Shelby, Miss.

But the retired four star general was not destined to take the 69th to Europe. Instead, the then Maj. Gen. Bolte was sent to Italy to take command of the 34th Infantry Division.

"We attacked north of Rome," the general said, "up to the Gothic line. Officially, the Italians had capitulated and partisan Italians were actually attached to American units. We were stabilized for the winter and then came the breakthrough and the capture of Bologna.

"The Germans in Europe were well on the way of being defeated and supplies had to come over the Alps to help out the Germans in the Po Valley and it was slow," he said. "The Germans had to move their tanks by oxen."

After the surrender of the Axis forces in Italy and the subsequent occupation of northwestern Italy, the 34th occupied the Northeastern sector.

VE-Day was also the general's 50th birthday. And for a birthday present, which he called none better, the 34th Division of the German army surrendered to Bolte's 34th Division.

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"The commander of the 7th Brigade of the 4th Division was Maj. Gen. Benjamin A. Poore," he continued. "He was of the West Point Class of 1886, the same class that Gen. (John J.) Pershing was in. Fifty-six years ago I married Gen. Poore's daughter, Adelaide."

He became a company commander with the 338th Infantry of the 4th Division in January 1919, two months after the armistice had been signed, and soon after became adjutant of the 4th Division with the Army of Occupation in Germany. He returned with the 4th to the United States in August 1919 and soon after he was adjutant of a provisional regiment of the 4th at Fort Sheridan, Ill., and Gary, Ind.

"In the winter of 1919-20, there was a steel strike in Gary," he recalled, "and our troops took over patrolling the city for five months as there were no police to call upon."

Inasmuch as he was a veteran of both wars, the general was asked to compare the Army and its soldiers of World War I with World War II.

"The equipment, operation and tactics of both wars were quite different," he said, "but the character, quality and ability of the American soldier were no different. There was no question about the the desire to serve their country to a victorious end.

"As to the basic characteristic of the two wars — they were offensive wars and the object was to gain victory over the enemy. World War I was a war of trench warfare to a certain extent. There was more mobile action in World War II than World War I. The second war was not one marked by barbed wire as in World War I. The fighting was just as hard in World War I as World War II and was not a pleasant occupation. The was more close contact between the sides in World War I than World War II."

Noting that the German soldiers were more fanatical in World War II, he said there a great proportion of them who were dedicated to Hitler and held a loyalty entirely different than loyalty to country.

"World War I was fought in more specific areas than in the case of World War II, which was literally a worldwide struggle," Bolte added.

Although he retired over 25 years ago, the general said he had kept in touch with each succeeding generation. "I expect to attend a meeting of general officers in which we'll review the general situation," he said, "and what things are needed."

One of the many highlights of

his career, he recalled, was assignment to the American Barracks in Tientsin, China, for duty from 1932-35 as a battalion commander.

"As a result of the Boxer Rebellion, occupation forces were stationed in northern China from Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Japan and the United States," he said. "After World War I, the German forces withdrew. We had a small garrison of less than 1,000. While the other powers had concession, we rented barracks for our forces. We had a peacetime function which was only to be ready to defend the railroad if it was necessary to get our embassy forces out of Peking."

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One of his many decorations is the Grand Cordon of the Order of the Most Blessed Trinity with Plaque received from Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia, received because of the influence he exerted to allow the Ethiopians serving in the Korean War to bring back their rifles with them.

SCHOLARSHIP/WELFARE TRUST FUND

hereafter to be received by the Settler without co-mingling with other funds of the Settler.

- 2. That the Welfare and Scholarship Funds shall not be drawn except on order of any two of the Trustees and in such amounts as the Trustees en banc shall determine.
- 3. In no event shall more than \$50.00 be expended on behalf of any one member of the Settler or any wife, widow or child of any member of the Settler without the written approval of the Board of Directors of the Settler.
- 4. That the Trustees shall in their discretion at a meeting called for such purpose set up scholarships for the children of members or of deceased members of the Settler, all in accordance with such plans and formula as they may develop but in no event is there to be expended in any one year more than 20% of the total funds held at the beginning of that year without the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of the Settler.
- 5. Annual accountings shall be made to the Settler of all monies received and expended.
- 6. The President, Executive Vice President, Treasurer and all of the Past Presidents of the Settler shall be the Trustees, and at least five of the Trustees then living shall be necessary as a quorum for any meeting.


