My Army Sergeant from the 69th was sending me some of the Bulletins from time to time. I was looking through Volume 35, No. 3, and found your ad on page 21. My reason for being interested is because I was one of the original 69th. I was shipped from Camp Perry, to the 69th when it was activated and ended up in B-Company, 273rd Regiment as a 60mm Mortar Second Gunner. After basic training a part of the 69th was shipped out as replacements and we were filled back-up with A.S.T.P. men and some ex-paratroopers.

We then started through basic again. The rest of the men who had not shipped out in the fall left the spring of '44, and I was one of these. I ended up at St. Lo, where I was put in the 9th Division, 60th Regiment, Company-D, as a Second Gunner on a 30 water cooled. We finally pushed through the hedgegroves around Paris, on into Belgium, and then Germany. I was captured September 25, 1944, at Aachen. I was sent to a POW Camp, and later on by train to where we would be working. Most of the time it was Munich. I was liberated at Laudsehat. I received your Bulletin from Gerald Ekholm, who was my Sergeant of the Mortar Section. Lt. Mennell was our Platoon Leader and Capt. King our Commanding Officer. It was interesting to read the book, but all the names were strangers. I enjoyed it just the same. I have read several of your Bulletins and only one time have I seen a name and a picture of a man I knew. He was Sgt. Stewart, pictured with a Russian when they met at the river. It has been a pleasure knowing you.



Margaret Morgan Dasher, Daughter of John A. Morgan Battery C-879th F.A. Writes . . .

My Father, John A. Morgan (known to everyone as Jack), Battery C-879th Field Artillery died suddenly on June 23, 1981. He had suffered from Multiple Sclerosis for about twelve years, and he died of a heart attack while undergoing treatment procedures.

His disability prevented him from attending the Reunions, but he looked forward, avidly, to receiving the Bulletins. My Mother, Margaret Cabrey Morgan, died suddenly of a heart attack on August 5, 1982. They were both 57 years of age.

Dad was an architect in Philadelphia until the time he was no longer able to negotiate the trip downtown every day. He spoke often of his Buddies in the service, but we (his children — he had seven) knew very little of where he fought or what he did, etc.

After his death we found a box filled with momentos from the War years. There were many photographs and notes about friends. Among those that seemed special were "The Big Three" — Dad, Eldon Nussbaum and Bob Aylesworth. Other names were: Bishel, Frieberg, Boone, Fattrosso, Crane, Rayborne and Kruger. Also Charlie and Lucky, The Battery Dogs. We know that he was especially close to Mr. Nussbaum and Mr. Aylesworth, and that he was writing to one of them at the time of his death. He attended a Reunion the summer of 1966, and that is the last time I believe he saw them, although I know they had been in touch since.

Through your Bulletin please inform them of my Father and Mother's death. I would love to hear from them just about anything they remember about Dad. As our family home in Pennsylvania is being sold, I am including my address if anyone wishes to correspond. Dad was so proud to have been a part of the 69th.


