## Ex-Soldier Who Fought For Peace Ready to Rest

When American and Russian troops linked up at Elbe River 38 years ago, Private Joseph Polowsky of the United States Army, standing above, was among the first Americans to make contact.

CHICAGO, MAY 3 — Time is fast running out for **Joseph Polowsky**. But he is still trying to rekindle the kind of peaceful understanding he first encountered in a German lilac field littered with bodies.

Mr. Polowsky, now a 66-year-old retired cab driver here, was among a handful of Americans on a reconnaisance patrol near the Elbe River 38 years ago last week. They were the first Americans to encounter advance elements of the Soviet Army in the historic linkup that marked the end of organized resistance to the Allies in Hitler's Germany.

The joyous meeting amid wartime devastation was etched in the participants' minds. "We swore," he recalls, "we would dedicate our lives to furthering friendship between our countries so wars would never happen again,"

Mr. Polowsky kept his promise. Over the years he has fired off an endless barrage of telegrams, letters, press releases and pleas to world leaders stressing how all countries need each other and how they need to halt the spread of nuclear weapons.

With a loan he managed to pay off recently, he even personally financed one of the reunions of the Russian and American soldiers who met near Torgau, in what is now East Germany on April 25, 1945, the day the San Francisco conference that founded the United Nations began.

This year, as he has for the last 10, Mr. Polowsky held a personal vigil on that day by the Chicago River. But this will probably be his last. A few months ago he learned he has cancer and doctors told him he probably would not live beyond this summer.

So, this year he is trying to raise \$10,000 so that his family can take his body to be buried near that same German field he found so peaceful and happy nearly four decades ago.

## Joseph Polowsky Wants America To Link Up With The Russians, Again . .

THURSDAY, APRIL 21, 1983 — ALL OF HIS LIFE, Joseph Polowsky has fought for his dream. Now he wants to continue the struggle with his death.

Joe is a retired Chicago cab driver who lives with his wife and family on the Northwest Side of Chicago. His 66-year old body is cancer ridden, and he is dying. Doctors give him until summer.

He can accept that. What Joe can't accept is that the dream that obsessed him all of his adult life might die with him.

It is a grand dream, one that "great" men struggle to produce every day. Peace between the American and Russian people is the heart of it. The dream grew out of an April day back in 1945. That was the day when Joe and sevral other American soldiers were the first to link up with Russian troops as the bloody march of an agonizing war slogged to a halt.

It happened deep in Germany near the Elbe River, on a day when lilac blossoms were bursting out in the warm sunshine and weary old women soaked their feet in the cool water of the river.

JOE REMEMBERS the details because the tentacles of that day wrapped themselves around his bones and never let go.

"I have devoted my entire life to that day," Joe said. "I had to do it, I had to try to make people realize that the terrible sacrifice of the war should be remembered."

Because he could speak German, Joe was with a patrol that went ahead of established lines back on April 25, 1945, and encountered Russian soldiers on the other side of a tributary of the Elbe River. He and others crossed in a boat and walked among corpses near a blown bridge on their way to meet the Russians. He remembers that among the corpses was a dead little girl, holding onto her dead mother with one hand a doll with the other.

Once contact was made with the Russian soldiers there was a wild celebration with joyful tears, wine drinking, accordion music and singing, Joe said.

"Those of us there swore an oath that we would never forget one another," Joe said, "and that we would dedicate our lives to furthering friendship between our countries so that such a thing (war) would never happen again."

JOE TOOK THAT OATH so to heart that it shaped his entire life. After the war and his return to Chicago, he traveled extensively, to New York and elsewhere, to try to get a resolution passed by the United Nations that would recognize the importance of the date.

Just as he felt some progress was being made, the Korean War broke out and dimmed his hopes. But he kept at it, Due largely to his efforts, nine former soldiers, including Joe, visited Moscow in 1955, and were reunited with some of their Russian acquaintances from the Elbe River meeting.

"It was a tremendous experience," Joe said, "We cried tears of joy and had a very pleasant time,"

Some money to finance the trip had been earned when Joe and others appeared on the "Strike It Rich" television show, but Joe also used what money he had or could borrow.

Joe continued his efforts on behalf of the "American Veterans of the Elbe River Link Up," and in 1958, seven Russian soldiers visited Washington, where a big dinner was held.

The dinner and other items cost a lot of money, and when it was all over, there was nobody but Joe to pay the bills, in spite of a news report by Eric Sevareid, in which the "plight of Polowsky" was discussed.

"After that newscast, a lot of people said they would help," Joe said, "but it all died down and no money came in."

Joe borrowed \$6,000 and paid the reunion expenses.

"I JUST GOT that loan paid off a little while ago," Joe said on a recent day as he sat in the living room of his modest apartment. His wife, Marie, looked at him as he spoke. She smiled and shook her head back and forth slowly. Her demeanor read as a combination of concern, sympathy and resignation.

Joe's obsessive dream has spilled over into the area of nuclear disarmament, and in recent years he has traveled to various places to try to exert his influence on its behalf. Several years ago he thought Israel had the key to worldwide disarmament and traveled there to try to talk to Menachem Begin. He found himself stranded and the U.S. State Department loaned him his travel fare home. As a result, his passport was confiscated and is being held until he can pay the \$900 it cost to get him back home.

Joe plans to stand his vigil on the Michigan Avenue bridge because the location symbolizes the place on the Elbe River where he and others met the Russians. He said that he wants to talk to people and explain about the importance of April 25.

AFTER HE DIES, Joe wants his body to be sent to Germany and buried near the meeting place on the Elbe River. There is a monument there, and when people visit it they can also visit his grave, Joe said.

He would like the members of his family to accompany his body to the burial, and he wants his funeral to begin with a Dostoevsky reading and conclude with Beethoven's 7th Symphony. On his headstone, along with an inscription, he wants a portrayal of shaking hands.

The Army, in a recent letter, commended Joe for his "participation in that historic event and your commitment to international reconciliation."

But the letter also said the government could not pay to have his "remains" nor his family transported to Germany after he dies.

If you see Joe up by Michigan Avenue bridge Monday, you might talk to him about that, too. He said he would be near the plaza in front of the Wrigley Building.
