My recovery has been far better than I had dared to hope, and I seem to be doing pretty well as long as I remember that I'm in my seventies and not in my thirties.

I retired in 1980 after teaching 33 years on the School of Theology faculty in Emory University, Altanta. I continued a little part time teaching, but now I have decided to "really retire" and do only what I choose to do. One of my projects in retirement has been transcribing my correspondence while in the service. For this we were each given a silver 2 kroner coin that had been issued for this birthday celebration. I still have mine, and it sure brings back many memories.

FROM WEST VIRGINIA 1-70 EAST:





Eight Soviet World War II Veterans Visit The United States

In response to an invitation from Dr. Donald Cole, RODC, who fought with the 69th Division during World War II and who attended the 40th Anniversary Link-Up Celebration on the Elbe River last Spring, eight Soviet World War II Veterans visited Ohio during UNIFYING OHIO FOR PEACE WEEK

The delegation consisted of Ivan Katishkin (Retired Colonel General), leader of the delegation who is Deputy Chief of the Soviet War Veterans Committee in the U.S.S.R and head of the Moscow Branch of the Soviet War Veterans Committee; Adolf Feidorov, Vice Chief of the International Department of the Soviet Veterans Committee and chief interpreter; Alexey Gorlinsky (retired Major General of Artillery) whom met the 69th Division at the Elbe; Alexander Olshansky (retired Major General) who met the 69th Division at the Elbe; Ivan Ryjkov (retired Colonel); Alexander Silvasko (retired Captain and retired Director of a secondary school) who met the 69th Division on the Elbe; Georgiy Prokopiev, a decorated hero of the Soviet Union; and Professor Igor Belyaev (retired Captian) and now Foreign Policy Editor for the Literary Gazette.

They arrived in Cleveland about 12:30 on Friday morning, April 18th. After only a few hours of sleep, they visited schools in Cleveland Heights and Shaker Heights where they met and talked with school children about peace, had lunch with the Cleveland Heights City-To-City Program, had a news conference at Cleveland City Hall, met with members of Cleveland City Council and then went to a Memorial Service at the Monument on Mall to those who died in World War II. The American Legion sent two color guards and the Coast Guard sent a color guard to the Memorial Service.

On Saturday they visited the V.A. Hospital at Wade Park and then went to American Legion Post 610 where Ivan Katishkin spoke about World Peace to a cheering group of American Legionnaires. That evening there was a large sit down banquet at The City Club attended by over 200 people. American and Soviet Elbe Veterans have taken a vow to do all they can to keep another war from happening and it was heart warming to have these men, now in their sixties and seventies, come so many miles to affirm their commitment to World Peace.



Mrs. Ann (Reinhardt) Stevenson Passes Away

Ann Sybil Reinhardt Stevenson was born in Leavenworth, Kansas on November 14, 1922, the daughter of Laura and Emil F. Reinhardt. Leavenworth is the site of a large federal penitentiary and also the site of an important military training school. Her father, a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, was a captain in the U.S. Infantry, enrolled at this military school. He later became a Major General and in World War II commanded the 69th Infantry Division, the unit that met the Russians at the Elbe River.

Ann spent her younger years at army posts in Kansas, Texas, Ohio, California, Washington, D.C. and Providence, Rhode Island. She attended high school in Texas, Stephens College in Missouri and the Eastman Conservatory of Music in New York.

In 1943 Ann married Lieutenant W. G. Stevenson and lived at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Camp Hood, Texas and Salt Lake City, Utah.

In 1947 they moved to a small mining town in Eureka, Utah where her husband was a geologist with the Chief Consolidated Mining Company. In 1947 their son Ricky was born. In 1955 afters tours in Nigeria, West Africa, Quebec, Oregon and Salt Lake, the family was transferred to Vancouver, British Columbia.

Ann enrolled in the Conservatory of Music of Toronto and graduated in October 1960. Ann set up a music studio in the family home in North Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada. Over the next 20 years, many students in the Delbrook Area enrolled in her classes for piano lessons.

Ann is survived by her husband and by her son and a daughter-in-law Carol, a granddaughter Mindy age 7, and a grandson Quinn age 4, who reside in Redlands, California.

Russian Visitation to the U.S.

The Soviet's signing it were: Major General Aleksia Gorlinski, Major General Alexander Olshanski, Colonel General I. S. Katyshkin, A. L. Feidorov, and Alex Silvashko. (This last man was the man in all the pictures with Bill Robertson and was the one that made the first contact with Bill). This document will be presented in Pittsburgh.

— RE-AFFIRMATION — THIRD MEETING BETWEEN AMERICAN AND SOVIET VETERANS OF THE ELBE

On April 25th, 1945, the United States "Fighting 69th" Infantry Division, commanded by General Emil F. Reinhardt, met units of the Soviet Union's "58th Guard Division" under the command of Marshall Koniev, on the bank of the "Elbe River" at Torgau, Germany. Ending Hitlerite Fascism in Germany.

Veterans of the "Fighting 69th" Infantry Division Association met once again with members of the Soviet War Veterans Committee to celebrate the fortieth (40th) anniversary of that historic meeting. Again on the bank of the "Elbe River," at Torgau, German Democratic Republic, April 25th, 1985.

Today, April 29th, 1986, Veterans of the same two (2) great World War II Army Units meet once again, for the third (3rd) time many miles to the west in Washington, D.C. on the bank of the historic Potomac River in the United States of America.

I presented him with a 69th lapel pin and told him to take it with him to Moscow and to wear it with pride and honor. His reply was, "I will." As I explained what it was, he told me that I didn't need to explain it. He already knew what it was.

Gene Butterfield Writes About The Defunct Air Cadet Program

This letter is long overdue, so I now have enough material for three letters. The moving factor now is Ray Turner's letter printed in the Bulletin for January-April 1986. Mr. Turner has no idea of how many men from Keesler Field went to the 69th Division, but I bet that Charlie Bolte (please excuse the familiarity General, but I consider you more of a friend today than as just an Army officer) could tell him almost to a man the number who arrived from Keesler Field. You may recall that besides you and Miller Harris almost all of the Division Combat Platoon was formed from the Air Corps Pre-Cadets who had originally transferred from ground troops to the program. In addition, a good number of the Motor Pool came from the same group, besides you, I am sure of Curtis, Avery (I think), Edmonds, and others who were at Keesler with us.

You may remember that the Combat Platoon had only two members still with it when we arrived, Corporal Beuthin (Cadre) and Andy Lucas (Hospitalized). Almost all of the rest came either from the M.P.'s (Brooks and Gene Neuendorf) or from Keesler. I will try a partial list - from memory - of those who were in the Cadet Program with us: Casimir Max, Gardner, and Vickers from the Armored Infantry at Fort Knox via Keesler (more of Vickers later on), Bragg, Farley, Roehl (mit der umlaut), Gottlieb, Alonozo, Stanley Helper (do you have his address? I talked with him in April when the Russians were coming to Cleveland), Reiders, Harm, Joe de los Rios (the Venezuelan), a name which has temporarily slipped my mind, the Freshman Half-Back from Michigan State, and so many others whose names and faces I cannot now recall. I know full well that I am going to be embarrassed by the name of some friend from Keesler that I have temporarily forgotten. Harry Dees, who died last year, also came with us, but I think was first assigned to the motor pool before becoming A Chaplain's Assistant.


Speaking of dulled memories, this letter was prompted by a slip in Ray Turner's letter to you. The V.F.W. National Convention was held in Cleveland in 1947, not 1948. Why do I remember so vividly? I had spent the summer of 1947 in New York at an encampment, then a trip to Washington, to Philadelphia where I spent a week with Casimir Max, then back to New York for about five days that had to end with both the end of my money and a real need to return to Cleveland to prepare for Donald Vickers of the Air Cadet Program and the third squad of the Combat Platoon who was arriving (with friends) as Delegates to the Convention from Douglas County, Georgia. I was expected to provide the social end of their sojourn in the big city, entertainment and GIRLS. A girl friend was alerted, and agreed to provide us with the female companionship, but when I returned from New York I found that she had let me down. We were one female short. So I finally asked a girl who had been in a Wedding Party with me the week before I had left for New York to serve as a date for Vickers, and she agreed - you know her, her name is Norma Gene. This coming July we will have been married 34 years, and I think that she still has never forgiven me for fixing her up with a date with Donald Vickers.

And like Ray Turner, I also transferred from the 87th Division at Fort Jackson to the Cadet Program, A Company, 347th Infantry. You can see how fortunate I was to find myself in the Division Combat Platoon after the two transfers.

Clarence, there is something I've been meaning to talk to you about. Starting with last June, I attended, with Norma Gene, evening sessions of the Tri-State Reunion in Cleveland on Thursday and Friday nights (was required to be in Chicago on Saturday and Sunday). You reported the names of those attending in the Bulletin, but not ours. Then we went to the National at Williamsburg. I played in the golf tournament, attended the Director's meeting on Wednesday night (didn't speak for the record, but was there when you spoke), talked with George Gallagher about the Scholarship Fund, attended the Business Meeting on Saturday, had breakfast that morning with Frank Nemeth, confered with him during the meeting at the front table, and sat next to Al Faison during the meeting. Again you did not report the Mrs. and me as having attended the convention. Clarence, are you trying to tell me something? Like I am dead and don't realize it?

I will now close hoping that you have made a complete recovery and that we can get together in Toledo. I am now back on my feet and getting around just fine after my stupid accident, If you weren't told, I had a problem with having been bitten by a brown recluse spider while playing golf last September. I didn't recognize the problem and then didn't take care of it right. This led to big trouble, a badly infected leg and a skin graft to close the open wound. I lay around with my leg elevated for three months, but get around fine now and am trying to get my golf game in shape.


