

Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall was built between 1908 and 1910 as a monument to the veterans of the "War for the Suppression of the Rebellion of the Southern Slaveholders" - known today as the Civil War. In 1963 the building was rededicated to the memory of all wars or armed conflicts in which the United States has been or may hereafter be engaged. It was officially given landmark status by the Pittsburgh History and Landmark Architecture of Allegheny County. In 1974 Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall was entered in the National Register of Historic Places.

World War II Veterans Are Reunited After 42 Years

This Reunion took place at the Tri-State Canaan Valley Weekend in June of 1988.

After 42 years, World War II buddies John Romano of Westover and Vernon L. Hanlin of Mt. Storm were reunited this summer.

John had given Vernon his address when he was discharged from the Army the earlier of the two and left Europe in 1945. Vernon misplaced the address, but found it this spring and invited John to the 69th Infantry Division's meeting of Tri-State veterans in June at Canaan Valley. For a while, each soldier served in a different unit, which explains why John wasn't invited outright.

"I was glad to see him," John says. "We were in our 20s when we served together. After all that time he looked the same, except he had gotten older and grayer, like me."

Vernon tells much the same story. "Except for being a little bit grayer and gaining some weight, he was just exactly the same. I would have known him anywhere and him me, too."

For a long time right after Germany surrendered, the two spent most of every waking day and night together as members of the 417th evacuation company.

"For six months, we drove a tractor and trailer together taking out American tanks that had been disabled during the war," Vernon says. "We'd go from sun-up to sun-down. They wouldn't allow us to drive at night. We slept right in the M-19 Prime Mover. Sometimes we'd be out for 10 days at a stretch. We survived on K rations."

The M-19 rode on 34 wheels — 24 on the back and 10 up front. Romano was the driver and trained Vernon to be an assistant. "You get to know a guy pretty good under those conditions over such a long period of time," Vernon says "John was a good soldier, a little reckless at times, but he was dedicated to his work."

Their work together involved bringing in disabled tanks from back country areas. "Sometimes we'd bring back tanks with dead soldiers in them," Vernon says of the grim task. "We were stranded in the snow several times."

During the war, Vernon had seen much of the actual dying as a member of the 69th Infantry Division, which gained renown at the Battle of the Bulge.

Vernon received the Bronze Star for bravery because of his actions at Uberrickshod, Germany, on February 22, 1945. Armed with a bazooka, he went ahead of his infantry unit and knocked out a German half-track that had the Americans pinned down. He also owns two battle stars.

During the fighting, John served with the 923rd Heavy Automotive Maintenance Company in Belgium, where he repaired gasoline tankers that had been damaged at the front.

He owns a battle star for that and was often under bombardment by the Germans. "They'd shove their V-1 rockets at us, usually at suppertime. I saw a lot of them when I was at Antwerp. The Germans threw things at that town like it was a pin cushion. They wanted the fuel there that the Allies had gotten control of.

"A V-1 would come over with fire coming out its end. When the fire stopped, it would come straight down and blow a square block out. I've seen it."

Romano recalls a monument in Brussels erected after the war in memory of Belgian prisoners the Germans had absconded to work arming the missiles. The monument is a V-1 missile, a dud, full of sand. The prisoners had secretly replaced explosives with the sand to save the lives of their compatriots.

"After the war, things were moving so fast I couldn't keep track of what was happening across the street," Romano recalls. "They were busting up old units and making new ones. That's how Vernon and I got together.

"For a time, we lived in barracks that had been occupied by the German SS. I took pictures of it then and the soldiers at the reunion this summer enjoyed seeing them. I took a lot of pictures. Vernon even remembered the pin-up girl on our M-19, but neither of us could remember her name."

The Reunion also brought sadness to Romano because it reminded him of the death of his brother, Sammy, who was killed in action at St. Lo, France, soon after D-Day. Sammy served with the 80th Infantry Division, which wore the Three Blue Ridge Mountain Patch, partly composed of West Virginians. John visited his grave at St. James, France.

John is a life member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at John Frazer Post 9916 in Westover. Retired, he and his wife, Margaret Ann, stay active in veterans' activities. She is a member of the VFW ladies' auxiliary at Westover.

John has served at military funerals in this area since he returned from his European service. He works now two days a week restoring a World War II Honor Roll for soldiers from Riverside who served during the conflict.


Vernon, a retired sawmill operator, runs a motel at Mt. Storm.

John is a retired mine machinery mechanic. He worked 21 years for the FMC Mining Equipment Division.

"He was a good soldier who did his duty," Vernon says of John.

"He was a brave soldier. His medals tell it," John says of Vernon.

Lamar W. Williams, 4365 Ruth Road, Birmingham, Alabama 35213 — 69th MP: I joined the 69th Infantry Division when it was being activated in May 1943. Since I had received a commission in the Corps of Military Police, I was assigned to the M.P. Platoon. Other Officers in the Platoon included Major John O. Tower, Commanding Officer, Paul Hayo (who was later aide to General Bolte) and Jim Warren, Major Tower was in command during training at Camp Shelby, and went overseas with the Division, as did Jim Warren and myself. After we were overseas, Major Tower was assigned to Military Government. He was a fine Officer, and we regretted to see him leave the Platoon and the Division. After a successful career in the education field and an Officer in the Army reserve, John retired and lived in Jenison, Michigan. We regret that he passed away February 8, 1989.

I stayed with the 69th M.P. Platoon until Germany surrendered, and then had the assignment of the Division Prisoner of War Discharge Center in Weissenfels, Germany. We processed some 8000 P.O.W.s during the weeks following the surrender. I was assigned to the 89th Division after the break up of the 69th for shipment back to the states. I was sent ahead to this ship as an advanced party to get it cleaned for the troops that were to come aboard. It had brought German prisoners of war to this country, many of them injured and there were bloody bandages and other junk to get rid of. Our detail was on board the ship three days early. Many years have passed since it sailed out of New York, and the 272nd History Book states that the entire Regiment was on it and the S.S. Santa Maria. Eight thousand troops were aboard the John Erikson. The big ship sailed on November 15th and docked at South Hampton December 1st, a voyage of 15 days.

I was fortunate to have been an Officer, as all of us had excellent accommodations. I was assigned to a cabin on B-Deck, which was the second one down from the top of the ship. The room had six bunks installed, and three Chaplains shared it with me. Having gotten there first, I selected the top bunk next to the port hole. The three Chaplains, all 1st Lieutenants, were Eugene Frein, Sherriell Storey, and Daniel Fichlin.

What a time we all had during the crossing. Directly across from our room was another full of Medical Officers, and they had a crap game started before the ship sailed. I am certain this game continued the whole trip. Later I was made Commander of B-Deck, which was full with I-272nd men. The enlisted men slept five high in their compartments. Where they were quartered had been a reading room in days past, and now the men sleeping in the top bunks would lay in bed and carve their names in the fine big wooden beams overhead. The British Aircraft Carrier stayed right in formation behind us the whole voyage. Every morning we could look out and see that all of the 35 ship convoy had changed positions during the night, but the carrier remained right behind us. The freighters looked like they were going to sink with their heavy loads, as the waves made them rise and fall in the water.

Looking forward to seeing you in Denver.

We Lost A Friend

I saw General Bolte on numerous occasions at Camp Shelby as well as at past Reunions, but it wasn't until 1976 at the Brandywine Hilton that our relationship become more personal. The finished product was presented to him at that Reunion. From that time forward General Bolte always greeted me with a broad smile, a firm handshake and an acknowledgement as to the whereabouts of the afghan . . . "It's in my room."

Vivian and I are fortunate to have our daughter live in the Northern Virginia area near the Bolte's. During our frequent visits to her, we always made time to visit General and Mrs. Bolte. In all likelihood we were the last 69ers to see him prior to his stroke. On July 3, 1988 we spent time with them at their Alexandria apartment and listened as they discussed their pending move to an assisted-living apartment.

It was also during that visit that we discussed the possibility of erecting a monument to the 69th at Camp Shelby. The General spoke of it enthusiastically, smiled, and stated that he would certainly like to make another trip there and see the monument in place. Unfortunately, it was a mere eight days later that his dream was eluded when he suffered a stroke.

We next visited them in late October, he was in a nursing home, Mrs. Bolte in the assisted living apartment. It was heartbreaking to see him in bed, unable to talk. Yet his hand still had a grip like a vise. When we saw him again in December he appeared somewhat better as we were able to converse The grip was still there.

Those two visits were difficult. To see such a strong man confined to a bed with no possibility of walking again was almost too much to bear.

After his death, it was Mrs. Bolte's request that donations made in his honor should be directed toward the erection of the Camp Shelby Monument.

With that in mind, I sincerely hope that the membership will see that dream come true, erect a monument at Camp Shelby in honor of our two great Generals and all 69ers and hold a Reunion in the immediate area.

I am glad to be able to say that I knew General Bolte and proud to have been a "Bolte Bastard."

No, it doesn't — and you don't look destitute; that's a nice suit your're wearing."

"Look, I have a heart problem — can't you at least take my blood pressure?"

"No, you aren't eligible for our services."

"What if I have a heart attack while leaving your hospital? That wouldn't look good in my obituary in The Chicago Tribune."

"Well, we'll take it just this once, but please don't ever come back here again."

As I was leaving, I thought of all the World War II veterans who think they are entitled to treatment at veterans hospitals — and when the time comes, they will discover they are not eligible. I wonder if the day will come when Hines will say, "Sorry, we don't treat Vietnam and Korean veterans anymore.

George H. Straley, 2723 Shipley Road, Wilmington, Delaware 19810 — Hq., 661st T.D. Bn.: It is sad for me to report the death of my old friend and comrade, John E. "Jack" Rickert, who suffered a fatal heart attack in his apartment at Ocean City, New Jersey, January 5th of this year.

We served together in Company B, 661st T.D. for some months before I was transferred to Hq., 661st, and he was transferred out of the battalion and sent overseas as a replacement. Jack finally saw action with the 100th Infantry Division. A lot of the fellows who knew and liked Jack never knew what happened to him after he left the 661st. He was captured by the Germans while manning a machine gun post in the Vosges Mountains during the Battle of the Bulge, in January 1945. He finished out the war in a concentration camp.

Jack's health was never very good after the war. He was in and out of VA hospitals, most recently the one in Elsmere, Delaware, but was living alone and getting along very well in his Ocean City apartment over the past ten years. I kept in touch with him, and I will miss him.

More on the Shuler Bible Story

Dear Editor,

I should like to be permitted to participate in the quest for the final resting place for Daniel R. Shuler's Bible. When our nation became party to the conflict, I was a student at West Virginia University. Along with others, I was also a student in the school's R.O.T.C. Program, and, upon being selected for the Advanced Program in my junior year, we were subsequently activated in the Army as P.F.C.s, I believe. At the end of the then current school term we were given the election of Infantry, Armored or Tank Destroyer Basic Training.

I, along with three others, opted for Tank Destroyer Basic Training, but, in the Army's own inimitable way, the four of us wound up at Fort Knox, Kentucky, and Armored Force basic training. Our Company at Fort Knox was a unique training company as about ¾ of the men in it were R.O.T.C, students from several eastern colleges.

It was at Fort Knox that I became acquainted with Daniel R. Shuler. As I recall, he was a southern young man with a very distinctive southern accent. It comes to mind that he had come from a similar R.O.T.C. program at The Citadel at Charleston, South Carolina. I further seem to recall that he was from a professional military family. It lingers in my mind that his father may have been the Commandant of the school (Citadel) or at least held some position with the school. My recollection of Daniel R. Shuler at Fort Knox is that he was a very "Gung Ho" military man - at that time. Our time at Fort Knox was during the summer of 1943. After we completed the Armored Force Basic Training, all the R.O.T.C. students were returned to their respective colleges to await openings for us in O.C.S.

And, in the Army's own inimitable way, after giving us 16 weeks of Armored Force basic training, it sent us to the Infantry O.C.S. at Fort Benning, Georgia. Upon completion, I was assigned to the 69th Division at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. Upon reporting in, I was assigned to F Company, 272nd, under Captain Herb Callaway.

I heard nothing further of Dan Shuler until we were in England, when Robert F. Scott, a W.V.U., Basic Training, and O.C.S. classmate told me that Dan Shuler was in his regiment (271st or 273rd). Bob was killed on a patrol in the Seigfried Line not too long after the 69th went on line. It has been through the writing in the 69th Association publication that I have learned of Dan Shuler's death.

At the time it happened, the story we heard was that the platoon (or patrol) - presumably Dan's - was in a German pillbox when someone's foot (or boot) caught on the pull pin of a satchel charge causing the explosion that killed all. After it happened, we were all cautioned to leave explosive charges outside of any enclosed gathering.

It is not my intention to further confuse this already confused matter, but I feel, and have felt, that I was a contemporary of Dan Shuler, having had basic training with him and his schedule of O.C.S. and assignment to the 69th were somewhat parallel with mine. Another contemporary of mine at W.V.U., Basic Training, O.C.S. and the 69th is James R. Kidd, who was in charge of the Reunion at Lexington, Kentucky last year (which I was constrained to miss). I feel fairly sure that Jim will also remember Dan Shuler from Fort Knox.

Does Anyone Remember Bernard O. McCormick?

I noted in ARMY TIMES that you are the contact point for an upcoming Reunion of the 69th Infantry Division. Therefore, my reason to contact you. One of my uncles, (now deceased), served in the 69th. I never got to know him very well, and on a long shot, thought I would write on the chance at your next Reunion, someone would remember him, and his military service.

The following is what I can offer to assist: My Uncle was Bernard O. McCormick from Sewickley, Pennsylvania. He was a T-4 in rank and I think he was with an AAA Battalion. He initially served in the Coast Artillery assigned to the Philadelphia area. When the 69th was forming, he volunteered and went to Camp Shelby, Mississippi with the Division. He deployed overseas with the Division and remained with the 69th until after V-E day when he came back to the United States for discharge. He returned to Sewickley for a few years, then moved to Florida where he remained until his death (to the best of my knowledge). I do know that he served in combat, being trapped behind German lines for several days, prior to safe return to United States lines. His ETO ribbon had two or three battle stars.

Enclosed is a picture of him taken in Germany after V-E day, prior to returning home. This may help some of your veterans identify him at your Reunion this year. If possible, I would appreciate the return of the picture.



Thank you for your interest in this request. I am sure you get many such requests, and I hope this is not too much of a bother to you. Any and all information you might be able to obtain is appreciated.





Ordeal of Liberation at Colditz

George F. Harper of Albuquerque, New Mexico has sent some information on Colditz requested in the September-December Bulletin. It is taken from a Master's thesis written by Eric Narveson, a history teacher at a junior high school in Fremont, California. He recommends for further reading "Colditz: The German Side of the Story" by Reinhold Eggers and "Escape from Colditz" by Patick R. Reed.

* * * * *

In the spring of 1945, two gigantic enemy armies had invaded Germany seizing or destroying everything in their paths.

The end of the war — the liberation of Europe — was in sight. Among the many places captured by the Allies that spring were Nazi prisoner of war camps. The storybook castle at Colditz with its cache of "problem prisoners" was one of them, Colditz lay roughly in the center of a geographic triangle formed by the cities of Leipzig, Dresden and Chemnitz (now Karl Marx Stadt) in Saxony, Germany. In April, 1945, the Soviet First Ukranian Army was advancing from the east, pushing a torrent of refugees ahead of it, while the U.S. First Army was advancing from the west.

Colditz had been a summer hunting lodge for Saxony kings for nearly 800 years, had fallen to the Imperialists in the Thirty Years' War and been occupied by the Swedes. In 1800, Colditz became a prison and in 1828, an insane asylum. The Nazis turned Colditz into a concentration camp in 1933; in the late 1930's, the grounds were used as a Hitler Youth Work Camp.

In October, 1939 the castle was an Allied prisoner of war camp. At first it held Polish officers captured in the invasion of Poland. Later Colditz housed only the most dangerous and habitual escapers — the Germans thinking it an excellent idea to keep all their most troublesome prisoners in one jail. Colditz gained a proud reputation among Allied prisoners of war as the camp for "bad boys." The castle held captive Czechs, Poles, Dutch, Belgians, French, Yugoslavs, Britons, Canadians, Indians, South Africans, Australians, New Zealanders and Americans.

The men were not discouraged by the fact that the Germans considered their camp escape-proof. An escape attempt occurred on the average of once every ten days for more than four years. Escapers tried every route: through walls and bars, over roofs and ceilings, under floors and foundations. Some were quick and impromptu and others were long and well planned. French prisoners spent eight months digging a 144-foot tunnel through solid rock, using table knives and soup spoons, only to be discovered by the Germans with less than a week's work left before breaking out. Other escape efforts were equally daring and imaginative. British prisoners even built a glider in the castle attic (although it was never flown).

Between escape attempts, prisoners busied themselves with baiting their captors, organizing pantomimes, musicals and full-dress 'ballets' featuring tough-looking POWs prancing about in paper tutus. A rough-and-tumble version of English soccer, called stoolball, was also popular. Food rations for prisoners were adequate, if not exactly delectable. Food parcels from home were occasionally permitted and were put into a pool for all to share.

The French, Polish, Dutch and Belgian POWs were removed from the camp in 1943. The remaining prisoners were primarily from the British Commonwealth. Escape attempts began to taper off after June 6, 1944 when the Allies landed in Normandy.

In the fall of 1944, new "special prisoners" began arriving at the castle, including three Americans captured by the Gestapo during the German conquest of Hungary in March. Other "special prisoners" included a nephew of Winston Churchill, the eldest son of the Viceroy of India, a nephew of Queen Elizabeth and King George VI, a Polish general who was the leader of the Warsaw Uprising of 1944, and John Winant, Jr., son of the American Ambassador to Great Britain. These men were kept separated from the rest of the prisoners, and their activities observed day and night. The Germans felt these men could be used to bargain for certain treaty concessions, for anything less than unconditional surrender.

A plan for a special rescue mission by parachutists was developed by the British and became a directive from SHAEF to the First Allied Airborne Army, but was never carried out, due primarily to the swiftness of the Allied advance into Germany.

The Allied POWs became apprehensive when a Soviet plane strafed the castle on April 9, and even more so on the next day when the remnants of a retreating German infantry regiment arrived in the town of Colditz and began arming the people of the town. The captain had orders to make a stand at the Mulde River, a few hundred yards west of the castle.

By April 11, the inhabitants of Colditz could see and hear the war first-hand. They also followed the progress of the U.S. First Army from BBC reports received on a hidden radio.

The Camp Headquarters received an order from the Army Command Area IV to move the "special prisoners" to another prison 50 miles east of Colditz upon receipt of a code word. On April 12, thousands of refugees were pouring over the town bridge across the Mulde to avoid the "inhuman" Russians. In town, the men continued to prepare a last-ditch defense, including planting explosives that dated from World War I under the town bridge.

Sometime after 5:00 p.m. the code word arrived, but the order was disputed by the Senior British Officer, W. "Willie" Tod, Brigadier E. F. Davies of the British Army, and Lt. Col. Florimond Duke of the U.S. Army. After agreeing to send the Colditz security officers and a heavy guard with the two trucks, the "special prisoners" were moved out, escorted by two motorcycles, an armored car and the reluctant security officer.

The next morning, the last vestiges of an SS division arrived in the Colditz area and prepared to defend the hills east of the castle. Sometime during the following 72 hours, the SS troops went to a concentration camp two miles south of Colditz where they murdered 400 Hungarian Jews who were being used as slave laborers. Four of the Jews managed to survive by crawling under the bodies of the dead.

On April 14 the order was received to destroy-evacuate the castle. The prisoners were to be moved east on any available transport, which consisted of one antique motor car and two horse-drawn carts. Tod refused to move his men and asked the Kommandant to inform headquarters of this. When the Kommandant could not get anyone at headquarters to take responsibility for the consequences of a forced move, he decided to ignore the order.

During the morning a watcher among the prisoners spotted American Thunderbolt fighter planes to the southwest. Twenty prisoners spelled out the letters "P-O-W" on the black cobblestones in the courtyard with sheets and blankets. One of the planes flew directly over the castle and the prisoners waved and cheered. They could clearly see the pilot and hoped that he had recognized them.

In the afternoon, as the outskirts of town were being hit by artillery fire, Tod and Duke went to the Kommandant and persuaded him to surrender the German garrison to the POWs. To avoid arousing suspicion of nearby SS, prison guards would remain at their posts. They were ordered not to fire upon prisoners or approaching American soldiers. No national flags or white flags were to be shown.

The Kommandant demanded compensation for his surrender: a safe conduct agreement and exoneration from any complaints of alleged violations of the Geneva Convention governing correct treatment of prisoners of war. This was granted with two exceptions. The first was the killing of British Lt. Michael Sinclair while he was attempting to escape on September 25, 1944. That had been "the Red Fox's" sixth escape attempt. He was only 26 years old when he was shot by a German sentry. Tod and Duke demanded a full investigation after liberation. The second was responsibility for the safety of the "special prisoners." If they suffered any harm prior to their safe liberation, the staff at Colditz would be held responsible.

On April 15 American Thunderbolts reappeared and began strafing strongholds in the town and a half-dozen American Sherman tanks entered the open fields two miles west of the castle and began firing. When the SS on the ridge returned fire, their aim was poor and several rounds fell on the town, killing many German defenders. They ceased firing. American artillery was firing at the castle and killed a German corporal and a French prisoner was injured. Lt. Kenneth B. Dodson of the 73rd Armored Field Battalion, Ninth Armored Division, intended to destroy the castle but firing was stopped when it was reported that French and British flags were hanging from the castle windows.

The battle continued for the rest of the day and into the night. Captain Guy Nunn was one of five American prisoners at Colditz and at 3:00 a.m. the Kommandant chose him to leave the castle and contact the Americans and lead them back to the prison to accept its surrender. Nunn waited until dawn, but when he went out he was greeted by machine gun fire. He identified himself to the GIs by calling, "This is kosher." It was a stroke of genius. No Nazi would use a Jewish word like "kosher," not even as a trick.

The two GIs (advance scouts from their company) recognized the uniform and followed him back to the castle. As soon as they were inside the gates, one of the soldiers went into a guard box and emerged with a framed picture of Adolf Hitler. Raising the portrait above his head, he smashed it to the cobblestones and ground it under his boot heel. A roar of cheers went up from the prisoners' windows in the castle. With that simple gesture they knew that they were finally free.

Colonel Shaughnessy arrived later to formally accept surrender of the castle and its garrison. Within two days of liberation, the ex-prisoners were on their way to England. The castle was occupied by American troops from the 9th Armored and 69th Infantry Division. They were forced to abandon Colditz in July, 1945 because the castle was located in a region by then designated as the Soviet occupation zone. Later, the castle was used as a hospital for Soviet officers suffering from venereal disease. In 1949, now part of newly created East Germany, Colditz returned to its uphappy function of insane asylum.









AN ODE TO OUR FIRST SERGEANT

We were a small group of men from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, where we had our training to join the 69th Division Cadre to be stationed at Camp Shelby, with the Headquarters Service Battery of the 879th Field Artillery Battalion.

After dismounting from the bus the first person we met was a gentleman by the name of Edward J. Stark. He was our first sergeant and friend from then on out.

We at the time didn't know how blessed we were to get such a compassionate man who took us under his wing and treated us all as part of a big family. From the time that we met till today, I know he had good feeling towards all of his men in his command.

When it came time to split the Battery he asked, and so as not to separate friends, who would like to go where, then had the orders cut. If he knew you had a birthday he would get you the day off (if we weren't in the field).

When we were in camp it was open house to our wives who were living in town on all holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas.

If a man was in the hospital he would take the time to write the man's family.

We were blessed to have as our First Sergeant Edward J. Stark, who helped guide many of the young men in the beginning of their lives and I hope to see him and his wife at the Colorado Reunion.

"B" COMPANY (272nd Infantry) AIN'T HERE

Forty-four springs ago in Germany, I was serving temporary duty to our 1st Battalion Headquarters. I was assistant to S-4 (1st Lieutentant Donald Swan). Just after the Rhine River was crossed in the vicinity of Koberg, S-3 and S-4 sent me on a harrowing night time mission.

I was directed to find "B" Company, attacking the Nazis. We had 2 AT Platoon 1½ ton Dodge 6x6 prime mover trucks. The chow, mail duffle bags, ammo and medical supplies for B Company. I had six enlisted men including the drivers. Maybe some are still alive. Please help with these heroes names. I will never forget their bravery.

Blackout march was the order when we arrived on the north side of Koblenz City, which had fallen to the 69th that afternoon. While passing very slowly through the narrow stone walled streets, with many balcony type of overpasses, we were fired on by some bad losers in the houses. The lead truck had some shrapnel marks. B Company had moved forward in pursuit of the Nazis. S-3's location was obsolete by about 4 to 5 hours.

A German Catholic nun told me that some American soldiers were being held in a large cave in the nearby hills, and that the Germans may be hiding in the cave too. I reasoned that the Americans or Germans soldiers could help me find B Company.

Upon locating the caves, the drivers stayed with the vehicles, and we all just raced into these candle lit caverns. We were several hundred feet into the cave, lined with benches, when we came upon hundreds of German citizens, hiding out from the U.S. Army. We picked out about 8 Wehrmacht Soldats, with civilian outer clothing over their uniforms, but their boots gave them away. I don't remember finding any GIs in the cave. The Nazi prisoners were helpful and cooperative and helped us find B Company about five miles outside of Koblenz City.

B Company was regrouping and resting up after fighting the whole day. We picked up a total of 52 prisoners. Some were wounded and all were beat up looking. When we got back to the 1st Battalion, 272nd Headquarters, I think our MPs took over the prisoners.

This mission took about 8 hours in the darkness. I remember that an EM on my mission was firing his 45 pistol over the heads of the POWs because of an attempted escape. I do recall putting my M-1 rifle in the face of the first prisoner we caught in the cave. His soldier boots unwrapped his hiding out attire. He was totally cooperative while looking into the 30 caliber execution rifle that I was holding on him.

I do not believe that 1st Battalion Headquarters made any special, or let's say adequate recognition, of the six enlisted men accompanying me on this mission.

Please send me the details of this mission, if you are one of the brave souls who were with me in the before written escapade. I confess now that we were lost in enemy territory for over six hours that night.

Just after the happenings of my short story, I was assigned to C Company, 272nd Infantry, as Weapons Platoon Leader.

I left for the CBI from Plotha GDR in July 1945. I served in Austria in the 26th, 83rd, and the 42nd Infantry Division until late '46.

I have a spare Division History Book that I found in a book store for \$15.00 in Columbus, Georgia in 1978.

1 also have an all original Walther P-38.





A Word On Our Center-Fold

The memorial tribute to the late General Bolté, in the center of the Bulletin, was put together by a member of A Company, 273rd, originally a New Yorker, long a resident of Arlington, Virginia, Pierce Rice.

Pierce's connection with the Association dates from the initial meeting at Colonel Adams' quarters on Governor's Island, held at General Reinhardt's request to explore the possibility (dubious in the minds of many) of reassembling, for social purposes, the gang that made up the 69th. He has the gloomy suspicion that, of that half dozen fellows brought together for that purpose, he is the sole survivor, which, if the case, makes Pierce the Senior Member of the Association.

Pierce, with the Division from its inception in May, 1943, may be remembered by his companions from Company A less as the Communication Sergeant than as, so to put it, the Class Artist. He spent a lot more duty than off hours pencil in hand, and when peace descended on us, he was on the staff, as its cartoonist, of the Division paper, THE SENTINEL. Back in the States, after the actual launching of the Association, for many years his drawings appeared on the covers of, and inside, the Bulletin.

The memorial plaque pairs the patch of the 34th Division with our own because it would be unreal to suppose that General Bolté assigned second place in his affection to the outfit he led through a strenuous fall and winter of struggle across the mountains of Italy. We can be flattered that his regard for ourselves was as strong as proved to be the case. The other patches shown are of the Fourth Division, in which he served during the First War, and the Seventh Army, which he commanded in Occupied Germany. The pin is the badge of the CAN DO Regiment, the 15th Infantry, which was stationed in Tien-Tsin, China, during the Twenties and Thirties, the War-Lord days. The decorations in the shadowy background are only a portion of those actually awarded the general.
