John G. Ruhl, 6 Lombard Court, Davenport, Iowa 52803 — F-272nd: I have enclosed an article from the Wall Street Journal written by Sol Schindler. Although I was in the first "batch" to receive the combat infantry badge, I still feel that making all with it automatically eligible for the Bronze Star was a mistake. Let's face it; there were lots awarded the Bronze Star for a reason.

Leonard Braverman, 28104 Espinoza Mission, Viejo, California 92692 — A-724th: This is my memory of an incident that occurred while serving with A-Battery of the 724th Field Artillery in Germany.

During April of 1945 we were ordered to the town of Kitzen, southwest of Leipzig. We immediately came under heavy enemy attack by 88mm and 150mm guns. The 88mm were almost like machine guns, since they came in so quickly. Their firepower was strong and continuous, resulting in some casualties. We were informed by Captain Diekman that we had no infantry support, and to sleep with the buddy system, one man awake at all times. I was alone at the edge of the field with my radio that buzzed constantly, and I figured that I had two alternatives; stay awake all night, or take my chances and go to sleep. I went to sleep knowing that if the radio stopped buzzing I would awaken. This way I wouldn't have to stay alert all night alone.

I awoke in the morning to a very heavy barrage of artillery. A half-track of D-Battery 461st AAA was knocked out and five men jumped into my foxhole almost smothering me, but I was very happy to have all of those bodies protecting me. A little later I received the order to CSMO (close station march order), and a truck was sent out to pick up my radio and supplies. Under intense artillery fire we loaded the truck and then I heard someone moaning. Running to a foxhole a distance away I saw an Officer who looked dead, but obviously was alive, with no blood showing on him. With the help of Corporal Mormello the truck driver, we put him in the truck and rushed him to a cluster of houses where the Medics were set up. I am not sure, but later I was told that his name was Lieutenant Fonde and his lung had been penetrated by a piece of shrapnel. The lung had collapsed, but his life was saved.

twice, and many trips to the doctor's office. She had surgery to remove a malignant tumor, and due to the fact that they found it early, everything looks very good.

I remember those days at Camp Shelby well, and that your hut was right next to mine. I was just 23 years old when I joined the 69th. How time has passed. Sorry I didn't make it to the Reunion this year as I had planned, but with my wife's problem it wasn't to be. Sure would like to see everyone. Maybe next year. Please give our best regards to those you see or communicate with. I have heard from several of the M.P.s and it is always good to get a letter.

Richard Bell Writes -

Dear Earl:

Your centerfold in the last 69th Bulletin, Vol. 42, No. 3, was of special interest to me. The World War II 34th "Red Bull" division which General Bolte commanded in Italy was the National Guard from my home town, Watertown, South Dakota. It was composed of men from the Dakotas, Iowa and Nebraska.

The Guard received notice in January, 1941 that it was to be Federalized into the U.S. Army. On February 26, 1941, they mobilized and were shipped to Camp Claiborne, Louisiana. They participated in the Louisiana maneuvers. They were the first American soldiers to arrive in the European theatre, landing in Ireland January 26, 1942.

On November 7, 1942 they landed in North Africa and fought all the way through the African campaign, then Sicily and Italy.

An interesting aside to this story is about John W. Vessey, Jr., who lied about his age and enlisted in the National Guard at age 16. In Africa, as a Sergeant in the 34th, he was Field Commissioned to Second Lieutenant. He stayed in the Army and eventually became the highest ranking 4 Star General in the Army, becoming Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in the 1970s.

Route of the 2nd Battalion, 273rd Infantry, 69th Division

NOTE:

The origin of these notes is very interesting as well as very informative to me. As a member of a front-line combat division, we were not allowed to keep a diary of notes so that, if captured by the enemy, little would be known of the Division's or 1st Army's prior movements or pending actions.

In December, 1954 pending the closing of the Link-Belt, Wilkes-Barre, PA District Sales Office at the end of the month/year and becoming a member of the Link-Belt Philadelphia, PA District Sales Office, my wife, Joy, and I were invited to attend the annual Christmas party/dance sponsored by the Philadelphia Branch.

Much to my delight, a Sales Correspondent at the Branch Office turned out to have been the 2nd Battalion, 273rd Infantry, 69th Division Medical Supply Officer, John (Jack) B. Adams.

He had, contrary to regulations, kept a diary and when he learned that I had no idea of our Division movements once we left Camp Shelby, Mississippi, he supplied these notes to me, taken from his diary.

I was severely wounded on April 18, 1945 and this concluded the war for me. See *** Pg. 2.

Lucci Visits Bebra-Weiterode and the Nolke's - Nolke Replies

In July of 1988, I visited Germany with my daughter Diane and my two oldest grandchildren, Jeanna and Stephen, who were then 13 and 12 respectively. We stayed five days in Bremen, visiting friends and relatives of my late wife Johanna and myself. As you know Hanna was born in Bremen and we were married there in November 1946. We also stayed for several days each, in Heidelberg and Rothenberg an der Tauber. En route we decided to stop by Kurt Nolke's house in Bebra-Weiterode.

In 1945 Kurt Nolke was a ten year old German boy. At the end of the war E Company, 272nd, was billeted in Bebra-Weiterode. Kurt Nolke has never forgotten the kindness he was shown then by the GIs, and has been trying to contact every member of E Company he can, to show his appreciation. In 1986 he attended our Reunion in Pittsburgh with two of his sons, at which time he extended an invitation to me to visit him any time I happened to be in Germany.

I looked him up in the phone book in Weiterode. His third son, Andreas answered, and told us that his father and mother had left just that morning to visit friends in Poland, and that his brothers Stefan and Cladius were also not at home. Neverthe-less he invited us to his house, and after refreshing ourselves, gave us a guided tour of his home town and the surrounding area, including a view of the iron curtain nearby. We spoke with several people in whose house the GIs were billeted and remembered this time well.

Two weeks ago I received the enclosed letter from Kurt Nolke, it is written in German. (Also enclosed is my translation.)

Dear Mr. Edward L. Lucci,

Since Easter and Whitsuntide have already passed, it is time that I, in the name of my whole family, again, thank you heartily for your Christmas and New Year's Greetings and for the pictures you sent. We regret very much our absence, during the time of your visit to our home. My wife and I were invited to visit friends in Poland, (Formerly, Upper Silesia in Germany). Conditions in Poland are comfortless, hopefully, things will soon be better for the people there.

Mr. Lucci, my wife and I, together with another couple from Weiterode, intend to visit the United States in September of this year. During this trip to America, we will be in New York on the 14th of September until the 15th or 16th. Perhaps it is possible that we can get together at this time, possibly you can give us a few tips (on things to do and see). We will arrive in New York in a rented car coming from the South to New York and continuing on to Niagara Falls and Toronto, to visit friends there.

According to my understanding, in reading the 69th Division Bulletin, the Veterans are planning a European Trip in the year 1990, under the leadership of Mr. W. R. Beswick. Lowell sent in the following newspaper article and letter home from J. K. O'Brien in 1945.

NEWPORTER CAPTURED HUGE RAILWAY STATION Lieutenant J. K. O'Brien Led 3 Men in Leipzig

Artillery Observers Left Behind by Infantry Cleared Out Nest of Germans

The largest railroad station in Europe, and said by the Germans to be the largest in the world — the Leipzig Hauptbahnhof — was captured by First Lieutenant James K. O'Brien, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael F. O'Brien of 48 Webster Street, and three of his men.

During the attack on Leipzig, in mid-April, Lieutenant O'Brien was with elements of an infantry battalion as an artillery forward observer. His particular job was to adjust the artillery fire of his battalion on enemy installations holding up the advance of the infantry.

When the infantry decided to wait until morning before advancing further, Lieutenant O'Brien took over an apartment house for his three men. Getting up about 5:00 a.m., he found the infantry had already gone and the colonel had left the observers behind thinking that artillery fire could not be used in the darkness.

About 6:00 a.m., while riding along in his jeep to catch up with the infantry, he came to the railroad station, by-passed the infantry. He saw a German soldier stick his head out a door so he stopped and taking out his pistol, went in to investigate. The German was an officer, either a major or lieutentant colonel. He grabbed the German officer and was told there were a few more German soldiers in the cellar. He gave the officer instructions to bring the men out and leave their weapons in the cellar. A stream of soldiers started to

come up and the officer dumped a pile of weapons in the corner

Believing that there were quite a few of them, Lieutenant O'Brien detailed one of his men to line up the prisoners in the street, another to watch the German weapons and took the third into the cellar and found several more Germans, including 100 women. He ordered the Germans out, warning that the Americans would descend upon them and kill them if they did not move rapidly. They lined them up and they were four abreast for a city block. Some infantrymen came along and he turned the approximately 200 prisoners over to them. Lieutenant O'Brien wondered what would have happened if the Germans had known he had only three men with him.

Lieutenant O'Brien says he is now living in a beautiful big house in Schkopau, Germany, close to Leipzig, that compares favorably with the houses on Bellevue Avenue.

His exploit in taking the railroad station is mentioned in the Fighting 69th Sentinel, a copy of which he sent to his family.

J. K. O'Brien's Letter to Mom and Dad

Germany 11 May, 1945

Dear Mom, Pop, and Kids:

Talk about living in solid comfort — well this is really it. I am now living in a beautiful big house that would make some of those houses on Bellevue Avenue look sick. It is a three story job with a bathroom on each floor. On the first floor there is a big front room - one side of which has nothing but glass doors overlooking the stone veranda and a beautiful flower garden. This room contains a large book case and a big grand piano. On the second floor are all the bedrooms. I have one all to myself. The floors of all the hallways are tile and those of the rooms are hardwood. I am writing this letter at a large desk in the study next to my bedroom. What do you think of that for a set-up?

I took a bath this afternoon in the master bathroom on the second floor. It felt so good that I just soaked in the water for about an hour. How I remember this past winter when I went two and three months without a bath. I think I'll set aside an hour every day for a bath.

Now that the shooting over here is at an end, I think I'll tell you how I captured the railroad station in Leipzig. Incidentally, it is the largest railroad station in Europe and the Germans claim it is the largest in the world.

During the attack on Leipzig I was up with the forward elements of an infantry battalion as an artillery forward observer. It was my job to report the situation to my battalion and to adjust artillery fire on any enemy installations holding up the advance of our infantry. At about 11:00 p.m. we were near the center of the city and the infantry decided to wait until morning before they advanced further. I picked out a nice apartment house for myself and the three enlisted men that were in my forward observer team. I kicked all the civilians out of the house - we never sleep under the same roof with civilians - and hit the sack. I got up about 5:00 a.m. and found that the infantry had already taken off. I was left behind because the colonel didn't think I could use the artillery fire in the darkness.

About 6:00 a.m. I was riding along in my jeep to catch up with the infantry when we went by the railroad station. It looked like Grand Central. I saw a German soldier stick his head out a door to see what was going on. I stopped my jeep, took out my pistol, and went to investigate. He was a German officer (either a major or a lieutenant colonel).

I nabbed him and in very broken German asked him if there were any more soldiers in the building. He said there were a few. I told him to tell them to leave their weapons in the cellar and to come out with their hands up. A stream of them started to come up out of the cellar. The German officer came up with a hand full of pistols and dumped them over in a corner. By this time I figured there must be a mess of them down there.

I detailed one man to line up the prisoners on the street outside. I left another to watch the German weapons (which were mounting up into quite a pile). My other man and I went down into the cellar to hurry them up. There were still quite a few down there and there were about 100 women down there also. I picked out a German officer who could speak English and told him that if the rest of the German soldiers didn't hurry it up that all my men would descend upon them and kill them all. He gave them the poop and they really poured out of there.

We lined them up in a column of fours in the road and the column was about a city block long. There must have been two hundred of them. Four or five infantry boys came along with 2 or 3 prisoners and I let them take my batch back to the P.W. cage. I guess if the Germans knew I only had 3 men with me they would have put up a fight — but I took them by surprise. I told my battery commander the story and he sent it in to the public relations officer. Don't be surprised if you read about it in the Daily News.

This turned out to be quite a long letter. I am in fine shape and making out O.K. I hope this finds you all well and happy. Continue to write often and pray for me.

P.S. You can send me a package of cookies and candy (also cheese and crackers) if you wish.

From the moment we landed at the airport until we boarded for home, Jack and June Runkle, natives of Denver, were always there, ready to show us the entire area, and make our visit a pleasant memory. We had a great time, only sorry it ended so fast. There are not enough words to express how lucky we are to have such wonderful friends.

Jack attended the banquet with us clad in full uniform, needless to say, he looked sharp and the cameras were busy snapping. Thanks again, for everything. God Bless!!

Received my copy of the bulletin a few weeks ago and as usual I look forward to it and spend all evening reading it. I've only been a member of the association for about a year thanks to the efforts of my former chief of section, Paul Molinari. He has been trying to locate me for years and finally caught up with me last July. I am originally from Maine and he from New York and we both ended up in Connecticut about 15 miles apart. It was a great surprise hearing from him and eventually getting together. We shared photos taken 40 years ago and he submitted a number of them for the bulletin. However, I am submitting some that he does not have.

I hope you can use these photos. They cost me \$70.16 to have made up. In talking with Paul recently he told me I could have submitted the originals as you would have returned them. Now he tells me. But anyway, please send them back. They will make my album more uniform.

A short story about "Molly" and me. We were in a night convoy doing about 5 mph. The road was a sea of mud about hub deep. I was sitting in the back of the weapons carrier half asleep. The w/c struck a hole and it lurched. Then the rear wheel struck the same hole and it iurched again. My helmet came off my head and fell into my lap. Before my groggy hands could grab it, it rolled off the tailgate and fell into the mud in the road. I shouted to Paul, (we called him Molly), that I had lost my helmet. About 15 feet further down the road the convoy stopped. Molly jumped out of the cab and came over to me and asked what I had said. I told him my helmet fell into the road about 15 feet back. Like I said, the mud was at least hub deep, over the top of Molly's boots. He went back and felt with his hands in the mud fishing for my helmet. Suddenly he called to me, "I found it" and brought it back to me and said "Keep it on your head." I thanked him and began shaking the soupy mud out of it - and then I looked at it. It was a German helmet, Jim Musa, (Utica, New York) sitting next to me said, "Throw that away before you get a hole in the head." I threw it back into the mud. John Bauman took his helmet and liner apart and gave me his helmet. I folded a towel and put it inside the helmet and put it on. I looked like Sad Sack but what the heck.

The next day John and I found an American helmet and other GI gear that hadn't been picked up yet from a recent skirmish. So I finished my tour with someone elses helmet. They probably built a super highway over mine.

A couple of new names from our outfit, 881st, C Battery appeared in one of the last bulletins, Don Taylor, our Captain's driver and Donald Pomas. If Pomas can get the 2nd or 3rd bulletin ago he will see himself standing beside me in a photo submitted by Paul Molinari. I'm also including a photo of Don Taylor and myself taken in Frankleben, Germany shortly after the war ended.

Can't make the reunion this year. Paul will be there and I told him, God willing, we would both go to the 1990 reunion if we can still get around. I plan to retire at the same time. I wish we could find more guys from the 881st, C Battery.





5-Year-Old's Prediction Will Be Realized in July

Local Man, Fighting 69th's 'Mascot' Will Reunite

A prediction made nearly 20 years ago by a 5-year old boy standing in the rain in Hagen, Germany, will come true in July for Jake Stark Jr. of 691 Dunkle Street, Enhaut.

The boy, fighting back tears as a truck loaded with American soldiers was about to pull away, told Stark:

"You'll come back. Some day you'll come back. . ."

Stark, then a staff sergeant with the famed 69th Infantry Division remembers the strained little face and choked up voice.

He was leaving a boy who, in the five months Stark served with occupation forces in defeated Germany, had been almost constantly at his side.

THE YEARS have intervened. Jake Stark now is 48. The little boy in Germany is 25.

But that prediction by Claus Luhmann — "mascot of the 69th" — is now to be realized.

Stark and his wife, Violet, parents of three children, are planning to return to Germany to places where Stark and the 69th had fought — and to see Claus once again.

The Stark children are Jake III, 22, serving as an Army MP at Fort Hood, Texas; Kenneth, 18, a freshman at Susquehanna University; and Margaret, 14, a 9th grader at Swatara Junior High School.

The Starks will be traveling with more than 150 members of the Fighting 69th Infantry Division Association. The

organization is marking the 20th anniversary of the division's climactic meeting with Soviet forces on the Elbe River at Torgau (actually on April 25, 1945).

Jake Stark today is pressroom employee of The Patriot. He says that after years during which he was out-of-touch with Claus, he has again learned of his whereabouts.

CORRESPONDENCE was restored through efforts of the editor of a German youth magazine who was able to locate the Luhmann family. He learned that Claus now is studying mechanical engineering at a technical school in Hanover.

Kassel, a stopping-off place on the 69th Division's commemorative tour, is 125 miles south of Hanover. It is there that a reunion between Stark and his little friend of the immediate post-war period is being arranged.

Stark says he can recall vividly the first time he saw Claus.

Stationed in Hagen, situated between Bremen and Bremerhaven, soon after the European hostilities had ended, Stark was walking down a street toward a mess hall where he saw a little boy walking toward him.

The boy was dressed in a cast-off U.S. fatigue uniform, many sizes too large for him. The pants had been cut down so that they resembled baggy Bermuda shorts.

"I was moved by his forlorn appearance. I asked him what his name was and where he was from," Stark says.

THE BOY told me he lived with his mother and a 12-yearold sister in a walkup flat nearby, that the family home in Bremerhaven had been bombed out.

Stark said he spoke to the boy in German — which he had learned from his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Stark, Sr., also Enhaut residents.

At that first meeting, Stark gave Claus two chocolate bars and went his way, thinking he would not see him again.

A few days later, he found the boy waiting for him. Their friendship grew — stimulated in part by the fact that the family was needy and hungry. And the boy needed clothes.

Stark visited the Luhmann home and learned that the father, an English Channel boatman had been killed by British shore batteries a few years before.

Claus began to learn English. "When's chow?" he would say.

Stark got permission from his unit's mess sergeant to allow the boy to join the soldiers at meals. Soon, Claus had a "uniform" — a refitted U.S. outfit, complete with overseas hat and sergeant stripes.

The boy accompanied Stark and others in the unit on trips and at social events, learning to salute officers along the way.

He was at Stark's side at weekly football games in the area, laughing and shouting at the players.

BUT A DAY of parting was inevitable.

It came late in 1945 when Stark and other soldiers were to be shipped home. Stark had urged Mrs. Luhmann to keep him at home the day the trucks departed. Besides, it was raining.

But moments before the truck left Stark saw him. There was Claus, running through the rain in his U.S. Army uniform, his face dripping.

He stood staring at Stark. "Well, Claus, I won't be seeing you any more," Stark told him firmly.

That was when little Claus made his tearful prediction. Today Stark and his wife have their passports ready.

Their adventures with the Fighting 69th begins July 9, when they leave New York aboard a chartered plane.

The trip will roughly follow the original march of the division through Europe — first Belgium, then France and across the border and deep into Germany.

MEMBERS OF the famous fighting unit will pass through fields, woods, valley and mountain country — to Bad Ems, Leipzig and on to Torgau, scene of that historic linking up with Soviet forces — places where men suffered and fought and died.

There will be visits for the Starks in Heibelberg with relatives they have never met.

But mostly there will be Kassel, and another link up.

That moment will come when hands which once were clasped in companionship and compassion amid wreck and ruin of Nazi, Germany are clasped once again.



I had searched 44 years for a Sergeant Hooten who had loaned me \$20.00 to spend on a seven day pass to Paris in 1945. We called our Sergeant Hooten but I learned at Denver this year that his name is Houghton. I found Sergeant Houghton and offered to pay him with interest if he would figure it up. Houghton refused with the excuse that he had forgotten about it. When I arrived back at the company from Paris Houghton had been returned to the states.

When we attended the 1988 reunion in Kentucky, I got Conrad Hooten's address. He is a member of our association. I wrote and asked him if he was my sergeant. I mentioned that my sergeant's parents had run a bakery and I thought it was in Oklahoma City. He wrote saying he was not my sergeant but he sent me a list of all the Hootens in Oklahoma City. February 9 — Arrived Heppenbach, Belgium at 1700. Rode from near Liege, Belgium by First Army trucks.

February 12 — Departed Heppenbach, Belgium at 1600 in organics. Line Companies in Quartermaster trucks. Arrived on Belgian-German frontier at 1900. Relieved 99th Infantry Division. Hq. Company set up Rear CP. Line Companies moved up on line during the evening.

February 13 — I&R moved up to Forward CP by jeep at 2300.

February 14 — I&R set up an OP at end of town of Udenbreth, Germany at 0900.

March 3 — Relieved by 272nd Infantry Regiment and moved back into reserve.

March 4 - Departed for Schoneseiffen, Germany.

March 9 - Departed Schoneseiffen for Hecken.

March 17 — Departed Hecken at 1330 by truck. Arrived Queckenberg at 1645.

March 24 — Departed Oberdrees by organic transportation at 1530. Arrived Bad Neuenahr at 2220.

March 26 — Departed Bad Neuenahr by truck. Arrived Burgbrohl at 1530.

March 27 — Departed Burgbrohl at 1900. Arrived St. Sebastian to cross Rhine River and then bivouac at Bendorf.

March 28 — Departed Bendorf at 0615 by truck convoy. Rode 15 miles, marched 10½ miles to Horhausen, arriving 1330.

March 29 — Captured 70 Germans in woods surrounding Horhausen. March 30 — Departed Horhausen at 0715 by truck. Arrived Aumenau at 1130.

April 1 — Moved by organics from Aumenau at 1915, 1 April, arrived Altenstadt 1035, 2 April. Distance 133 miles.

April 3 — Departed Altenstadt, half of HQ Company in organics, other half walking. Troops walking left at 0705 and arrived Escheberg at 1325. I&R set up an OP near town

April 5 — Departed Escheberg at 0745 to Alanbusch (19 miles). Arrived at 1805. Crossed Fulda River.

April 6 - Departed Alanbusch to take Lutterberg (11 miles).

April 7 — Moved from Lutterberg and advanced to Ziegenhagen. Arrived at 2100, 8 April. Crossed the Werra River.

April 9 — Moved from Ziegenhagen at 1900 by truck. Arrived at Gertenbach at 0135 (19 miles).

April 10 — Jumped off on spearhead from Gertenbach with Combat Command R of the 9th Armored Division.

April 11 — Moved from Issersheilingen to Roldisleben. Left at 0930 and arrived at 1935. Distance about 45 miles. Convoy was strafed near the town of Kolledo. When we reached our destination we were strafed again by enemy aircraft. Our AA and 50 cal, machine guns drove them away. No casualties.

April 12 — Moved from Roldisleben at 0930 and stopped three hours at Obernessa, Started out from Obernessa at 2335. Distance from Roldisleben to Obernessa about 50 miles.

April 13 — Moved from Obernessa to Elstertrebnitz 12 April at 2335 and arrived at 2100, 13 April (12 miles). Opposition strong. No casualties.

April 14 — Moved from Elstertrebnitz at 1545 to Wilderheim, arriving at 1815 (11 miles). No enemy aircraft enroute.

April 15 — Moved from Wilderheim at 1045 and arrived at Leupahn at 1740. Distance about 27 miles. Have 17 men from Colditz guarded in a barn, believed to be prisoners of German Gestapo. Released them in the morning.

April 16 — Moved to Colditz at 0915 and arrived at 1320. Distance 5 miles. Captured 24 Germans in woods around Colditz. One German shot while trying to get away.

April 21 — Moved from Colditz at 1645 and arrived at Altenhain at 2045.

April 25 — 1st Battalion, 273rd Infantry met Russians at Torgau.

May 30 — First truck to take men into Leipzig on pass left in the afternoon.

June 19 - 3 EM leaving on quartering party to Ersrode.

June 29 — 28 men leave the company for the 29th Infantry Division.

July 1 — Moved from Altenhain at 0730, Boarded train, arriving Ersrode at 1050, 2 July.

July 13 — Moved from Ersrode at 1145 to Raholdshausen. Distance 7½ miles.

August 15 - Japan surrenders.

August 16 — The 69th Division placed on alert. Will move back to the U.S.A. within a month with high point men.

NOTE: I have verified the spellings of all towns as they appeared on my copy of the extract, using a detailed map of Germany. They are all correct with the exception of the April 15th entry. I believe WILDERHEIM should be WILDENHAIN.





Historian's Report: On Purple Heart Medal's Origin

Over the years since I was wounded, I have heard a lot of speculation as to the specific construction of the Purple Heart Medal. One of the most prevalent rumors was that the Purple Heart Medal contained an ounce of gold. After contacting the makers of the original medal, I discovered that this rumor was unfounded.

The Bailey, Banks & Biddle Co. of Philadelphia, Pa., received the original purchase order, dated February 12, 1932, from the Philadelphia Quartermaster Dept. The order was for 40,001 Purple Hearts at a unit cost of 86¢ a piece. The price of the individual medal alone dispels the rumor that the Purple Heart Medal contained an ounce of gold.

Further proof as to the makeup of the Purple Heart Medal is found in the specifications sheet issued by the Institute of Heraldry on January 22, 1937. It is presumed by the Institute of Heraldry that the description of the medal used in 1937 was based upon the specifications used for the original Purple Heart Medal. The institute's 1937 specifications called for "A medal of bronze, gold plated and enameled in the shape of a heart, with an enameled shield and a group of leaves at the top A gold plated superimposed figure, shall be attached mechanically and by solder to a point at the center of the medal and an enameled background of pansy purple ... surrounds the figure. With a gold plated rim, 3/16 of an inch wide around the enameled background." The finish "... shall be plated with not less than 5 grains of gold, per dozen, of an approved color. The medallion shall be highly polished before and after plating."

I have been unable to find any record as to whom the first medal was issued, nor is there record as to when it was issued. There is an easy way to identify a Purple Heart Medal as being from the original group because all of the original 40,001 medals have a number that is on the edge of the medal. Based upon the fact that the first 40,000 were numbered, we do know that the original supply ran out around the end of 1943. Back then, the MOPH listed the Patriots' Purple Heart number on their membership cards. Medal No. 39,495 was listed for Alex Anderson of Blue Grass Chapter 146 on his membership card dated November 25, 1943.

Our cover this issue is the Purple Heart. How many of you knew it? Are you a Purple Hearter? I am and I belong to the New Kensington. Pennsylvania chapter along with Clarence Marshall and Paul Shadle. Might I just recommend that if you are a Purple Hearter, do join a chapter in your town or nearby town. One of their main causes is to support the local veterans hospitals and veterans in those hospitals by giving them parties, taking many needed items to them, and a list of many other things. Remember, if you have a Purple Heart and are still able to get around, isn't it nice to know that you can help a vet who wasn't as fortunate as you. Next best thing to the 69th Infantry Division Association is to be a member of a Purple Heart chapter. Think it over, I did and now Earl E. Witzleb, Jr. is a Purple Heart member.
