

During the last week of September, Bill Haden passed away from a long bout with a respiratory disease. Bill was able to make only the first of our reunions in the Roanoke-Salem, Virginia area. I was a First Sergeant, Headquarters with the newly formed 461st AAA, in the late summer of 1942, when Bill was received along with the rest of our new men. It did not take long to see that this man had special qualities and would be a leader of men. When he did earn his stripes, he made an excellent sergeant and was a credit to both his men and his country. His training included some 10 months at Camp Haan, California and the Mojave Desert just off Death Valley. This was followed by our cruise to England, and a full year of training there, which prepared us as well as could be expected for the Normandy Invasion over Omaha Red Beach.

I won a Battlefield Commission during the Battle of the Bulge, and joined the 2nd Platoon of Battery C-461st. Not long after, I became its Platoon Commander and Bill then won a Battlefield Commission and was assigned to my Platoon as Assistant Platoon Commander. They got to see each other two other times while they were overseas. It will be sad for me to see Ed's name under Taps, but we had 47 good years together.

LeVerne Loveland, 517 Rosewood Terrace, Linden, New Jersey 07036 — G-271st: It has been 46 years since I arrived at Camp Shelby for my basic training with "The Fighting 69th Division," but most of those memories have been indelibly set in my mind. I have been receiving the Association publication since it began, which I have appreciated very much, and enclosed is my check for \$100 to help offset the cost for its printing and mailing.

I arrived at Shelby in April of 1943 and trained there until about May of 1944, when I was shipped out for overseas duty in the E.T.O. In July of 1944, I was on the front lines in Normandy assigned as a rifleman in the 90th Infantry Division. That was just before the break out of the Caen-St. Lo area. I remained with the 90th until being wounded in March of 1945. Since my combat duty was with the 90th, I always felt more strongly attached to them, so I let my interest with the 69th wane. However, your publication has kept me informed about many of the great soldiers responsible for my training, and my good buddies in Company G, to name a few: Sergeant Jensen, Corporal Quickle, Sergeant Bigelow, Fernandez, Plugge, Corporal Giglietta, Spurrier, Salas, Minnick and Curran. So many fine men, and every once in a while, more names and memories come to mind. Like the March to the Sea (Biloxi and Gulfport).

The 69th was always referred to as the Three B's, but we always knew it as the 4 B's. I pray for the men and women and their families who had to pay with their lives, and for all those who suffered serious wounds which are a continual reminder of the War. Also for the innocent people who suffered so much which made War the only answer. Fortunately, most of the World Powers have come to realize that War is not the answer, but sitting down and discussing a disagreement can resolve problems. Neighbors and countries will always have disagreements, but we don't need the money-making munition businesses in the background needling the opponents. Education about the devastation of War is the answer for civilized and primitive people, but until that is learned, everyone is security conscious and untrusting. Remember the days when we didn't have to lock our doors, or secure our borders? I hope in our lifetime, those days will return.

Lawrence D. David, a West Mifflin resident, has been added to the heroes honored in the Hall of Valor of Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall museum. David received the Silver Star award during World War II when he was a Private First Class in the Medical Department of the United States Army's 69th Infantry Division, He crawled forward under murderous machine gun fire to rescue the commander of a rifle company, who was seriously wounded in an armored infantry attack on Leipzig, Germany, April 18, 1945. After treating many others, his platoon was cut off, and he crossed a 75-yard street under intense sniper cross-fires to rejoin his unit to administer additional sorely needed aid.

The Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall's building/museum is open daily from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m, and from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. on weekends.




Saturday, August 18th, we'll have the Men's and Ladies' Meetings in the morning and the Banquet in the evening.

Mississippi family filmed historic closing of gate in Berlin Wall

HATTIESBURG, Mississippi — After Martha Polk Douglas of Hattiesburg and her family drove their car from East Berlin into West Berlin, the Brandenburg Gate closed behind them, Twenty-eight years later, the gate is still closed.

"I believe we were the last car out of East Berlin," Douglas said.

The family members, who were touring Europe at the time, were the last people to cross the boundary between East and West Berlin before the Soviets closed the passageway in 1961, separating the two Berlins. Just last week, the Berlin Wall began coming down and East Berliners began pouring through openings in the wall to enter the free city.

The Brandenburg Gate has yet to be reopened, but German officers have indicated it will open soon. CBS tentatively planned to broadcast excerpts from the films Douglas took of the final separation of East and West.

"These movies that I have show the consternation and the bewilderment on the faces of the people there. They couldn't believe this was happening and that whoever crossed over was not going to get back either way," Douglas said.

The Douglas' sons, Ed and Lake, were 10 and 23 at the time. They have memories of soldiers forbidding their father, Merle Douglas of Gulfport, to take pictures. But their mother kept her movie camera running anyway.

"I realize now that I was probably foolish and it was taking a chance," Douglas said.

The family had made many trips to Europe on annual family vacations. One son, Lake Douglas, is director of public art for the New Orleans Art Council. Ed Douglas is an architectural historian in upstate New York.

The Douglas' had spent the morning touring a devastated East Berlin.

"It was just devastation past the Brandenburg Gate. It was a bombed-out city from World War II," Douglas said.

What Is A Veteran?

EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans Service personnel often are asked what constitutes veteran status for a particular veteran's program. Though we may look up the answer in a Veterans Service Officer Handbook or Title 38, we are not fully provided with the answer to the underlying question, "What is a veteran?" Perhaps the following passage, the author of which is unknown, will help to provide an answer. We got this from Texas. We think it merits repeating.

"The veteran is special because he is selected. The fact that he is selected makes him something special. He is no longer free; he is subject to military law. He becomes a special breed, committed to fight to the death for the ideals of freedom around the world.

He cannot be flat-footed; he cannot be lame; he cannot be uncertain or short of vision, he must be as perfect as possible. The veteran must be mentally alert. He cannot be moronic; he must be able to read and write; he must have some talent. He must be morally fit. He cannot be a criminal; he cannot be perverted; he cannot be nervously unstable. He must know the difference between right and wrong. He has lived in unsegregated barracks, blacks and whites together, as equals they fought together for freedom.

Only the best physically, mentally and morally are called to war. The tragedy is that only the best are fit to be killed. In our sophisticated society, this special breed performs a sacrificial service. Only the brave are selected and only a race of ingrates would forget their sacrifices.

This special breed, this select group, these physical specimens - only the best - these citizen soldiers went to war, at the behest of Congress in defense of freedom all over the world and they became the best fighting men history has ever known.

They came home as VETERANS - gassed or shell-shocked from Chateau-Thierry, bedraggled from the Battle of the Bulge, hungry from Corregidor, frozen from the Chosen Reservoir, maimed from Vietnam. Some came back with yellow fever, some with malaria, some with tuberculosis. Some came back psycho, some alcoholic; yes, some even returned as dope addicts. These are the men who were the best when they went to war. God only knows what conditions they were in when they came back.

If you are asked, "What's special about a veteran?" answer firmly, "The Veteran is something special, he is our charge, he is our responsibility. He answered our call when we needed him - first in war."

Having been privileged to sit with the 69th Division Association Board of Directors for the past several years, I can well appreciate the growing concerns of our leadership over difficulties in planning ahead for each annual reunion. It seems that there is still a strong interest in attending a reunion, but not enough general support in helping with the planning and assistance that's required to host a local reunion celebration.

Coupled with the selection of an adequate site, and the leadership that is very necessary, it would seem that the future of an annual reunion beyond 1991 is very much in doubt. 




69th Infantry Division Memorial-Congressional Medal of Honor Grove, Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge.

BOOK REVIEW

Best Little Stories from World War II:

Here is a sparkling new book about the adventures of individual soldiers, fliers and sailors in "Our War." But in addition to recreating the immediacy of battle, the author manages to take the reader behind the scenes and show what was happening at the Roosevelt, Churchill and Hitler levels.

For example, six of the 101 "best little stories" in the book deal with Adolf Hitler's services as an infantryman in the First War, how he later rose to political power and how in Our War he led his generals around by the nose (often with disastrous results for his own side).

The book's author is chief editor of two outstanding military magazines — World War II and Military History, which are published by Empire Press, Leesburg, Virginia. He is C. Brian Kelly, who also teaches journalism at the University of Virginia.

Mr. Kelly presents first hand accounts of the 36th Division at the Rapido River in Italy, the 29th Division on the Normandy Beach on June 6, 1944, the 3rd Division on the Southern France invasion beach on August 15, 1944, and the 99th Division in the Battle of the Bulge on December 16, 1944.

Mr. Kelly also brings back many famous World War II writers for a "curtain call": as basis for his own short narratives, Mr. Kelly cites the work of Studs Terkel (The Good War), William Shirer (Berlin Diary), Ernie Pyle (Brave Men), and Anne Frank's Diary. Other stories are culled from division newsletters and the letters of ordinary GIs.

Mr. Kelly's book can be ordered from Montpelier Publishing, P.O. Box 3384, University Station, Charlottesville, Virginia 22903-0384. The price is \$10.95.

Mr. Kelly hopes to do a sequel if the present volume is well received by the public. If your association or individual members of your unit have articles from old newspapers or unit newsletters describing first-person experiences in the war, Mr. Kelly would be grateful to receive a photocopy for his next book.





M-18 at Fort Knox, Kentucky, October, 1989.

Certainly was a pleasant surprise to look out the church door and spot Earl, Dottie and Enrico and Anne D'Angelo stopping by. Do wish you could have spent at least a couple hours so that we may have shown you the points of local interest.

We had just returned the day before from a three day visit to the Tank Destroyer National Reunion. They had a very good program of activities planned. There was a dinner-dance cruise up the river on the Louisville Belle. One day was devoted to a trip to Fort Knox and a sit-down dinner at the officers club. In the afternoon the dedication of a Tank Destroyer Monument and a tour of the Patton Museum.

The Museum of Southern New England of Danbury, Connecticut brought their M-18 and had it on display. The next day they brought the M-18 to the Louisville Speedway and everyone who wanted a ride or wanted to drive it had a chance to do so. This was really the highlight of our trip. The M-18 is one of only two in the United States; the other at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, owned by the Army. Even fortyfive years old, it looked just as modern as the Abrams tank

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of today and looked and operated just like brand new. Bill Beswick was the first to drive it and was tickled he had this experience.

On the History Book: The T.D.s as well as the 69th has engaged Turner Publishing to print a history book. Their deadline has already passed and been extended for receiving individual biographies. I would strongly urge all members to send theirs in even if the deadline has passed. It stands to reason that any biographies received while the book is being compiled will be included. Pictures of any size are acceptable as they can reduce or enlarge; it is not necessary that you buy a book.

No one seemed to know the cost of the satellites.

The battalion markers when, placed on their own, are only three foot tall, but still the same 16" square on a two foot base.


My Dear Friends of Battery B,

Dear Clarence,

I would like to thank you for sending me the last bulletin. Enclosed is my check to put me back on your mailing list. My address will be the same for now.

After the last letter Bob sent to you, he was more in the hospital than out. On the 13th of April they even put in a pacemaker at the Air Force Hospital in Lackland, Texas. We went for one more checkup in May to Texas and that was our last trip. After that it went very fast, but he never complained.

He came home from the hospital on Wednesday, July 5th, but on Friday I had to call his doctor and on Saturday, July 8th, I had to take him back to the hospital where, in the Emergency Room, he suffered a fatal heart attack, fifteen days after his seventieth birthday. He was interred at Riverside National Cemetery with full military honors.

Bob was in the Air Force for 24 years and while stationed in Ramstein, Germany, he suffered a massive heart attack which led to his retirement in January, 1969. He was declared 100% service connected disabled with Angina Pectoris and Congestive Heart Failure. Subsequently, he went through two open-heart by-pass surgeries.

After he came back from his last visit with his old comrades from Company F, 273rd, in Niagara Falls, he told me how much he had enjoyed every minute of it, but he was sorry he was unable to attend more reunions.

In September, 1989, we had planned to go back for a visit to Celle, Germany, to the fortieth Air Lift (Luftbrucke) reunion. Bob was in Celle only two days in 1949, when we met. We had been married for almost forty years when he passed away.

We all miss him very much, especially our two grandchildren who were his pride and joy. I feel so lost because I depended so much on him.


